

Four Teams Slated for Sports Day Duty

Take a small, furry ball — beat with racket . . . a slightly bigger, harder ball — hit with bat . . . a leather ball — smash with feet . . . and add a 'leisure' noon snack of an exhibition on the cinders and you have the ingredients for a day of college sports entertainment.

And that's what the Nebraska Athletic Department has in store for visitors tomorrow at the 13th annual All Sports Day.

The action starts at 9:30 a.m. Saturday morning with the Iowa State-Nebraska tennis match.

At 10:30 a.m. Coach Tony Sharpe's baseball club squares off with Colorado in a nine-inning battle.

And at noon, the Husker cindermen meet Kansas State in a dual, followed by the spring football finale — an intrasquad contest.

TENNIS

The Nebraska tennis team will be seeking its second conference win against one loss when it meets a talented Iowa State crew tomorrow at 9:30 a.m. at the NU Courts.

The Huskers have won six and lost two on the year and have turned in four shutouts. In Big Eight competition, Coach Ed Higginbotham's squad edged Kansas State, 7-0.

The veteran-loaded Iowa State team has won eight and lost two this year. The Cyclones finished fifth in the loop meet last year and are considered a darkhorse team again this year.

Dick Gibson, Dave Wohlfarth, Jim Fowler, Tom Johnson and Jack Lausterer will play the five singles matches

for the Huskers and Higginbotham will probably go with Gibson-Wohlfarth and Fowler-Johnson in the doubles.

Making the trip for Iowa State will be Tuck Bosburg, Tom Line, Dave Scheiding, Lou Counter and Dainis Kvisitis. All but Scheiding were on last year's team which whitewashed the Huskers, 7-0.

BASEBALL

Six Husker seniors will be making their final home appearance this weekend as Colorado invades for a three-game series.

The seniors include Steve Smith, who is leading the Big Eight with a .449 batting average, Don Purcell, Dick Becher, Pat Salerno, Bill Redmond, and Dave Myers.

Ron Havekost and Ernie Bonistall will take the mound this afternoon for a doubleheader at 1:30 p.m. at the NU diamond.

Tomorrow the Huskers will meet CU in a single game at 10:30 a.m. as part of the All-Sports Day activities. Keith Sieck will get the nod for the single game.

Plagued somewhat by wildness this season, Sieck has nonetheless amassed a 2-1 record. He is third in innings pitched with 25 1/2 innings.

Coach Tony Sharpe has juggled his lineup somewhat to try and match Colorado's potent batting attack.

Smith, the Huskers' leading hitter with a .453 average, has moved to the second slot with Becher moving to third and Purcell taking over the clean up spot.

The probable batting order reads, Don Schindel, cf; Smith, rf; Becher, lb; Purcell, c; Salerno, lf; Dale Anderson, 3b; Tom Ernst, ss; and Redmond, 2b.

Bufs Play NU Today

Colorado visits Lincoln for a three-game series with Nebraska on its last road trip of the campaign. The Buffs meet NU in a doubleheader today starting at 1:30 p.m. at the Husker Diamond.

The Buffaloes, riding the crest of a three game sweep over previously league leading Kansas, are in fourth place, one-half game ahead of Kansas. Colorado stands 8-6 in the conference and 12-8 overall.

Jim Westervelt, Ray Melvin and Don Gunsauls combined for Colorado's three wins against Kansas.

Gunsauls was a surprise starter but pitched six-hit ball in winning, 7-1. Gunsauls has seen little action on the mound since being shelled by Oklahoma State in the second inning of the Buffaloes' second conference game.

The big pitcher also slammed two home runs in the Kansas series to up his season total to seven.

But the big gun in the Colorado batting order last weekend was centerfielder Gale Weidner who banged out eight hits in 11 trips to the plate. This outburst upped Weidner's average to .397 for the season and 434 against conference pitching.

Weidner, a footballer in the fall, was an All-Big Eight and All-American in baseball last season.

Westervelt, another All-Big Eight choice last season, pitched another six-hit effort for the Buffaloes, as they won 7-4.
