District meetings will be held in Scottsbluff, Ainsworth, Broken Bow, McCook, Wayne, Columbus, and Beatrice Sept. 24-27.

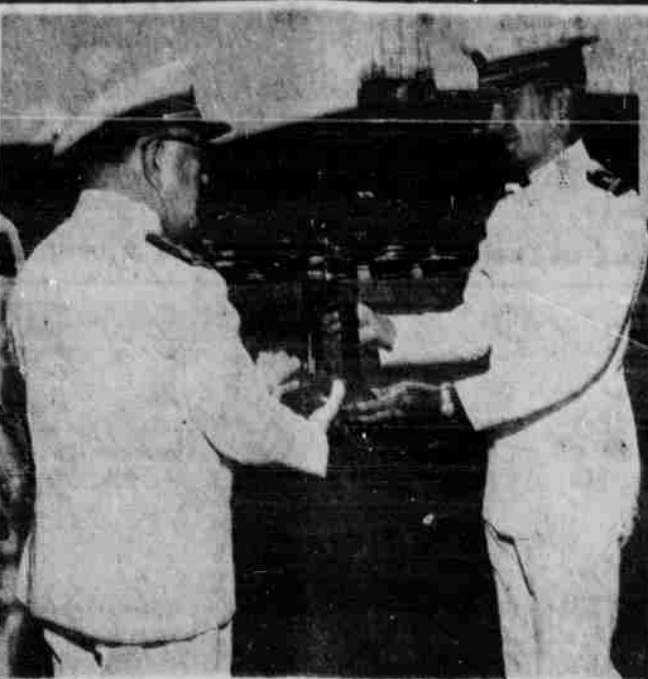
## Alumnus Editor Tells Innovations For Fall Editions
