Approximately 3,000 graduate fellowships and 165 postdoctoral fellowships will be awarded by the National Science Foundation (NSF) next March.

The fellowships will be awarded to college seniors, graduate and post-doctoral students and others with equivalent training or exper-ience in the fields of mathematical, physical, medical, biological and engineering sci-ences; also in anthropology, psychology, geography, eco-nomics, sociology and the history and philosophy of sci-
