

Student Health to Sponsor Diabetes Tests

Student Health will hold a drive in conjunction with National Diabetes Week next week, to find University students who may have this disease and are not aware of it.

Dr. K. D. Rose, chief of laboratory and medical research, said that according to national percentages about 173 students out of the population of 10,400 have diabetes. Of these, he estimated that 100 students know it and 73 do not know it.

He explained that since the test is held each year, students can catch the disease before any serious effects occur. Diabetes, which ranks seventh in the list of causes of death by disease, can be fatal unless properly treated.

The usual signs of diabetes are increase in thirst, constant hunger, frequent urination, loss of weight, intense itching, easy tiring, pain in fingers and toes, changes in vision, and slow healing of cuts and bruises. However, diabetes may be present without any signs at all.

The most likely targets are

those who are related to diabetes, are overweight, or are past 40 years of age. However, it can strike at any age.

Weight control is an important prevention of the disease. It can be controlled by diet, exercise and, if necessary, by insulin. Recently developed oral tablets also help to control the disease.

Failure to detect the disease or neglect of it may cause such serious complications as heart disease, falling eyesight, hardening of the arteries, kidney disorders, gangrene, cerebral hemorrhage, and diabetic coma.

There are two purposes to the testing drive, explained Dr. Rose. They are to help instruct the students in what is available to them in terms of early detection of one disease and to further public health education.

New Technique
He said that four years ago, Student Health devised its own diabetic test and did a public paper on it. However, they now use the National Diabetes Association technique which is fundamentally the same.

Dr. Rose said that Student Health has 5,000 test packets this year. All staff members and employees will receive about 1500-1700 of them. Directions for taking the test are on the test packets.

Organized living units can contact Student Health for further information and to receive the test packets. Free dispensers will be placed in the Student Union, Administration building, Seftick, Burr Hall, Fedde Hall, Love Library, Love Memorial dormitory and the Women's Residence Halls.

All doctors' offices in Lincoln will also be free clinics during the week for diabetes tests.

Last Year Successful
Dr. Rose said that last year they had a fairly successful drive when they received 850 tests back, out of the 3,000 distributed. He hopes that they will be able to get up to 50% return on these tests which would be over the national average of 14%.

"I just want the students to do it since it is such a simple procedure," said Dr. Rose. He added that they found several cases last year.

Dr. Rose, also chairman of the Lancaster County Diabetes committee, said that students who have positive tests will be notified within a week after they have mailed the tests to Student Health. These students will be called in to have blood sugar tests done on them and establish what degree of diabetes they have. Dr. Rose said that occasionally there are false positive tests.

rights; that government's duty is only to protect and safeguard those rights; that government is a political, not an economic institution; that its job is to insure political freedom, not economic security; that man becomes a responsible being only when he is allowed to make his own decisions, face his own trials, attempt on his own, fail on his own, and succeed on his own; that it is the capitalist system which brought forth the strongest, wealthiest, most educated, finest nation in the history of mankind; and that given the chance it can do it again.

Secondly, we must develop a public relations system. We must see that labor ceases to picture Republicans as plump, fat, wide-tied Babbitts; that America again comes to know Republicans, not as proponents of an old worn-out belief, but as fighters for a philosophy which emerged during the enlightenment centuries after welliamism and socialism had been tried and failed.

We are now ready for the 1960's. Our very defeat, limited though it was, has brought forth an increased awareness of the problem at hand. We now know that the fight is no longer just between two political parties, but between two political philosophies preaching incompatible doctrines. We now have the men to do the job. With men such as William Buckley we have gained an articulate rhetoric and a sense of history which has long been needed and can only help us. We are now beginning. By 1964 we will be ready to win.
