-Peffer Says- Institutional Employees Aid Therapy

"All employees of institutions for the mentally retarded are really potential therapists, and that includes custodians as well as the professional staff," said Dr. Peter Peffer, superintendent of the Glenwood and Woodland State Schools in Iowa.

Dr. Peffer was the keynote speaker this week at the first informational conference on dynamic health at the University. He said that the most important informational work now needs to be done with employees of the institution, as well as the general public and relatives. "The staff and all employees must really believe in the efficiency of treatment or training, and must be enthusiastic," he said. "It is well known in this business that most employees' problems fall within the category of social incompetence rather than work incompetence," he said.

Dr. Peffer said there has been far too little understanding of the problems of employees in mental hospitals and retarded institutions.
