

Heart-lung machines now in use require a lot of Red Cross blood to prime the system, which is a costly use of blood. Dr. F. Lowell Dunn, chief of cardiovascular research and recipient of the grant, is working on a whirl-ing disc method which requires less blood and which may lead to an unusually efficient oxygenator.

Cecil Bromfield and Roger Jorgenson, sophomore medical students, are assisting Dr. Dunn in the investigation.

A foreign language requirement for the Ph.D. degree which has caused informal professorial debates for years at the University has now

According to Dean Roy Holly of the Graduate College, the old requirement — a read-ing knowledge of two foreign languages on a specified list

— still stands for those who
choose to meet it but others may qualify by demonstrating a reading knowledge of one foreign language and meeting one of the following

three alternatives: - Demonstration of a comprehensive knowledge of one foreign language (it can be the same as used for reading) by fluency and effective two-way translation; or

- Demonstration of a mastery of a special research technique approved by the student's committee and the Graduate Council: or

- Demonstration of an acquisition of knowledge, after expected.


