Ag College Attracts Foreign Tractors

The activities of the College of Agriculture's tractor-testing station are causing international interest, according to L. F. Larsen, engineer in charge.

In contrast to the operations of the station when it was established in 1962 one-fourth of the 24 tractors tested were made in foreign countries, Larsen said.

The station was set up by the old bicameral legislature to test tractors made by companies selling to farmers in the state.

Last year, the nine companies whose tractors were tested at Lincoln included two from England, one from Germany and Czechoslovakia and

one tractor with an English engine.

The University scientists test horsepower at the tractor hitch because pull is usually less than factory-rated horsepower.

Engineers test each tractor's efficiency at full throttle, half, and three-quarters throttle in each gear, at the drawbar, belt pulley, accessory power takeoff, and at each wheel of the new four-wheel drive tractors.

Also tested are fuel and oil economy, stalling propensity, and safety features.

Two weeks are required to test every sales point of each tractor.

The University tests plows, seedbed preparation machinery, weedeaters, fertilizer applicators and irrigation equipment in addition to tractors.
