

Navy, Renegades Pace IM Squad

Lytle on Mythical Squad Third Time

NROTC, this year's All-Independent and All-University champions, has placed two men on the Independent first team. Larry Lytle of the Dental College team is on the team for the third time.

With four of the men over six feet, the squad is one of the bigger aggregations of the intramural league; the average height of the squad is 6'2".

The navy team was led by two top overall players—Don Schafer and Dick Ratzlaff. Schafer played one of the forward spots for the navy squad and, according to their coach, Lt. T'Anson, was the team's top player both offensively and defensively.

Schafer is a graduate of University High where he lettered three years in basketball and track. He is a member of Sigma Nu fraternity and is a junior, majoring in civil engineering. Schafer is 6'3" and weighs 180.

The other navy spot is filled by Dick Ratzlaff, who plays the other forward spot on the mythical squad. Playing for the Navy champs, Ratzlaff scored 17 points a game and was one of the better ball-handlers on the squad.

Ratzlaff is 6'1" and tips the scales at 165 pounds. He is a member of Theta Xi fraternity, majoring in accounting. After graduation, he hopes to go into flight training in the Navy program.

Ratzlaff attended Aberdeen, South Dakota, Central High where he lettered in football and basketball.

Bob Krall, the mythical team's center, stands 6'5" and weighs 195 pounds. During season play for the Renegades, he was the team's top rebounder and scored 15 points a game.

Krall, a graduate student, attended Grand Island High where he played basketball and baseball. He played on the high school basketball team that defeated Boys Town for the state championship in Class AA.

Larry Lytle, Dental College forward, is on the All-Independent team for the third straight year. This past year, Lytle averaged 15 points a game and paced the Dents to a third place finish in the independent league.

Before coming to the University, Lytle spent four years at Chadron State Teachers College where he played football and basketball. During his junior and senior years at Chadron, he was on the Nebraska College Conference basketball team.

Lytle attended Chadron Prep and was an All-State selection when Chadron took the state Class B basketball championship in 1952.

Lytle is 6'2" and weighs 180 pounds.

He attended Lincoln Plus X, playing both basketball and baseball. On the baseball squad Gaughan played the shortstop post and played against the Hastings Jr. Legion team in the regional

NU Recruits Gridders

Nebraska football recruiting is gaining momentum as Coach Bob Devaney and his staff have signed a number of outstanding Nebraska high school products.

All-state halfback Kaye Carstens from Fairbury and Lincoln Southeast are among the Nebraska prep gridders to sign letters of intent at the University of Nebraska.

The letter of intent is an innovation of the Big Eight and Southwestern Conferences. Any athlete who signs the letter is contracted to play at the school he signs for as soon as the transaction is recorded.

When he signs, no other Big Eight or Southwestern conference school can sign him away. Coach Devaney pointed out that the provision does not apply to schools of any other conference or an independent. That is, theoretically, a Big Ten school could sign any athlete who contracted by a letter of intent from Nebraska.

"There are several boys who haven't made up their minds or who we are considering from Nebraska high schools," Devaney added.

Devaney said out-state recruiting was still in the early stages. A number of offers have been made and boys will be visiting the Cornhusker campus soon to help them make their decision.

As for next year's prospects, Devaney seemed most concerned about depth in the line and somewhat in the backfield. That concern seems justified as Nebraska lost four of the six top ends, at least one of the first two linemen at every position except center, plus three of the first four fullbacks.

"There are a lot of good boys from the freshman team, which was very well-balanced, who we will need help from," Devaney said. Of course, we can't tell yet who the good boys are going to be, but spring practice will give them their chance."

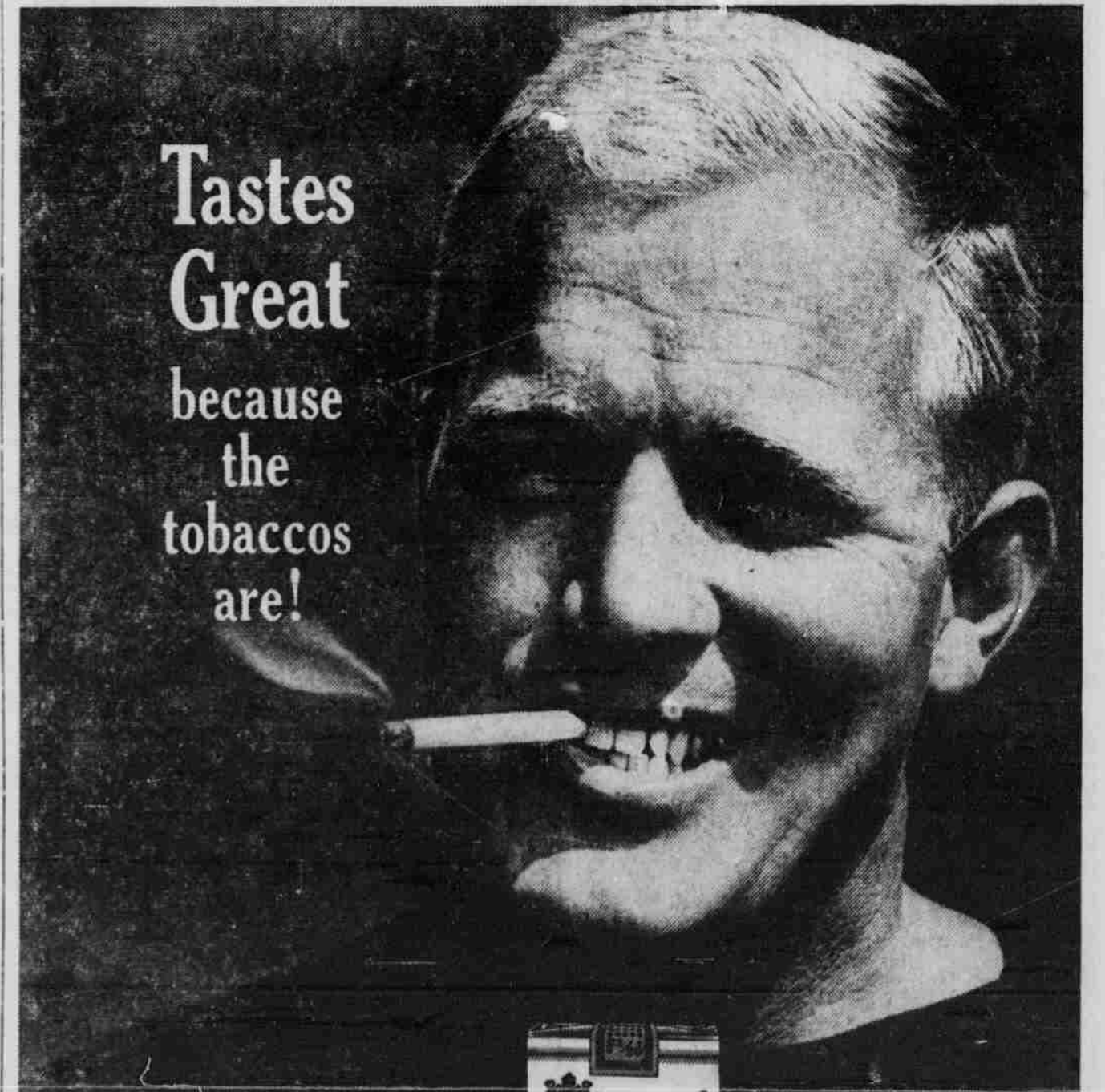
