Professors Discuss Frosh Honors Plan

Nebraska high school principals and guidance counselors were told yesterday afternoon that finding the "right" students for the freshman honors courses still needs further refinement at the University. Earlier, Lee Chatfield, director of the Junior Division, listed these criteria used in selecting the honors-course freshmen: high intellectual capacity, demonstrated "grade getting" ability and inclination, skilled in "testing"; at least of "information recognition" common to standardized tests, competence in the "memorizing" and "feed back" of the typical classroom operation and evidence of independent thinking.

Professors from English, mathematics, agriculture and history were optimistic about the results of the newly established honors courses for the top entering freshmen.

Speaking at the annual Principal-Freshman Conference, Dr. Robert Hough of the English department said he fears that the "intellectual pop-off" is missing from the honors courses.

"And these are the people who provide stimulant for the classes," he said. Dr. Edwin Halfar of the mathematics department said they are making an extreme effort to find individuals with "that spark of creativity."

Educator Declares Need For Planning

An official of the U.S. Office of Education, Dr. John Cameron, told Nebraska educators this morning that "deep dedication and very intelligent planning" is necessary to meet the present-day challenge of education.

In a telelecture to the Nebraska Audio-Visual Association conference at the University the chief of the school housing section said:

"While the world is in an unprecedented period of scientific development and increase in knowledge, there are still many schools in this country which are teaching the same things in the same way that they were 40 years ago."

He said the challenge is to make available stimulating opportunities for learning to every boy and girl, regardless of his race, where he may happen to reside or his socio-economic background.

To accomplish this, he explained, there must be planning on the national, state and local levels.

Discussing national planning, Cameron said, "With the mobility of population we have in this country, the chances are very slim that a boy or girl will make his home in the same community, or even the same state, in which he received his education."

"There is also a pretty good chance that he may receive his education in several different communities. So we don't really 'educate' to meet the community needs' as was thought to be the case not so very long ago."

"National planning is also important in the matter of identifying and meeting the manpower needs of the country," he added.

Discussing increasing responsibility for education on the state level, Cameron urged the exchanges of ideas and the development of long-term goals of accomplishments.

He also listed two types of planning on the local level. One, he said, concerns itself primarily with the educational planning and its implications for a particular school.

The second type, he explained, involves determining what the schools should be accomplishing and to develop immediate and long-range plans for the achievement of these goals.

All applications may be picked up and returned to the Builders Office, 342 Student Union, by 5 p.m., Friday, April 5.


YR Exec Applications Ready; No Interviews
