## Med College Will Sponsor Special Pediatrics Course

Physicians from the Great Plains area will gather in Omaha, April 15th and 16th for a special course in diseases of children to be offered at the University College of Medicine.

Dr. Gordon Gibbs, chairman of the department of pediatrics at the College, said that the major portion of the course will be devoted to the most common disorders of children seen by physicians.

Guest faculty speaker Dr. Jonathan Lanman, professor and chairman of the department of pediatrics at the State University of New York's downstate Medical Center in Brooklyn, has been engaged in research to determine the advisability of using certain hormone therapy with children suffering from respiratory diseases.

Dr. Gibbs said that once the normal gland has been upset in a child, it is often impossible to attain a normal function again.

Dr. Harold Goldman, instructor of pediatric radiology at Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center in New York, will also participate in the program as guest faculty lecturer.

Although such therapy has been used for some time, there is a question concerning the function of the adrenal glands in recovery from these diseases.

In some cases it has been shown that certain treatments impair adrenal function and result in extensive bleeding and an imbalance in the endocrine system.

"Upper respiratory diseases, including the so-called common cold, make up from 65 per cent to 80 per cent of the pediatric medical practice at this time of the year," said Dr. Gibbs.

One of the speakers, Dr. Robert Parrott, director of Children's Hospital and Research Foundation at Georgetown University and George Washington University in Washington, D.C., has been concerned with identifying the various types of "colds" and with placing them in their proper category. He has also been trying to find vaccines to prevent the infections.

Included in the respiratory diseases are several types of influenza—Asian flu and at least 20 different virus infections.

In the past, the majority of these have been labeled under the classification of "common cold." The discovery that there are several different kinds of infection, has brought the problem of finding effective vaccines for them since each organism responds to a different vaccine.

It is therefore highly improbable that at this time a general vaccine against the "common cold" will be successful, commented Dr. Gibbs.
