

Baker, Smith Get Research Awards

Dr. Marvel Baker of Lincoln and Chauncey Smith of Columbus, Ohio, were presented awards of merit Tuesday night by the Nebraska Chapter of Gamma Sigma Delta, an agricultural honorary.

Both were selected by members of the society for their outstanding contributions to agriculture.

Dr. R. M. Koch, chairman of the University's Department of Animal Husbandry, cited Dr. Baker for his pioneering work in the field of animal husbandry. He is known widely for his research in beef production.

Prof. Lloyd Hurbut, chairman of the NU Department of Agricultural Engineering, singled out Smith's contributions as a teacher, researcher and engineer. He was associated with the Nebraska Tractor Testing Program for 35 years, and was chairman of its board of engineers from 1947 until his retirement in 1955.

From 1955-57 he was dean of the University of Nebraska Staff in Turkey. He headed the NU group which is helping the Turkish government establish a new land-grant university at Erzurum, as well as strengthening the existing University of Ankara's agricultural college.

Dr. Baker has been president of the American Society

of Animal Production and chairman of the North Central Region Experiment Station Directors. He is a member of a number of professional and scholastic societies, and is the author of many bulletins and papers on beef cattle and swine breeding, feeding and management.

Mr. Smith is a graduate of the University and had an early career as a school teacher. He was a member of the NU faculty for 37 years, and is credited for developing a laboratory for teaching the principles of ignition, carburetion, valve timing, and other aspects of an engine. Early research by Prof. Smith resulted in advances in tractor oil filters, control of bindweed by cultivation and corn culture.

He retired from the University in 1955, signing a contract with Michigan State University as an agricultural engineering representative on its team to upgrade teaching at the National University of Colombia, South America. Later he worked for the Agricultural Education Department of Ohio State University, teaching special courses for vocational agriculture teachers.

In 1962, he was awarded the Cyrus McCormick Gold Medal by the American Society of Agricultural Engineers.

Former Faculty Member Works With AID

Elmer Schick, former college professor of the University, has been serving with the Agency for International Development in Guatemala for the past three years.

Schick is conference coordinator for the U. S. Regional Office for Central America and Panama (ROCAP) which was established by AID in August, 1962 with headquarters in Guatemala.

Social and economic integration forms the major part of the Declaration of Central America adopted by President Kennedy and the presidents of the six republics of the Isthmus (Guatemala, El Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua and Costa Rica) at their meeting last March in San Jose, Costa Rica.

ROCAP also maintains liaison with the United Nations Economic Commission for Latin America in Mexico City and provides loan and legal services to AID missions in the various countries of the Isthmus.

ROCAP works closely with organizations formed by Central Americans themselves to help bring about unification of the economics and raise educational standards.

These organizations are concerned with varied activities related to the attainment of a Central American economic community and include creation of a common market, regional development

Schick's responsibility for ROCAP is to coordinate the many conferences held among the regional and national organizations and their specialists.

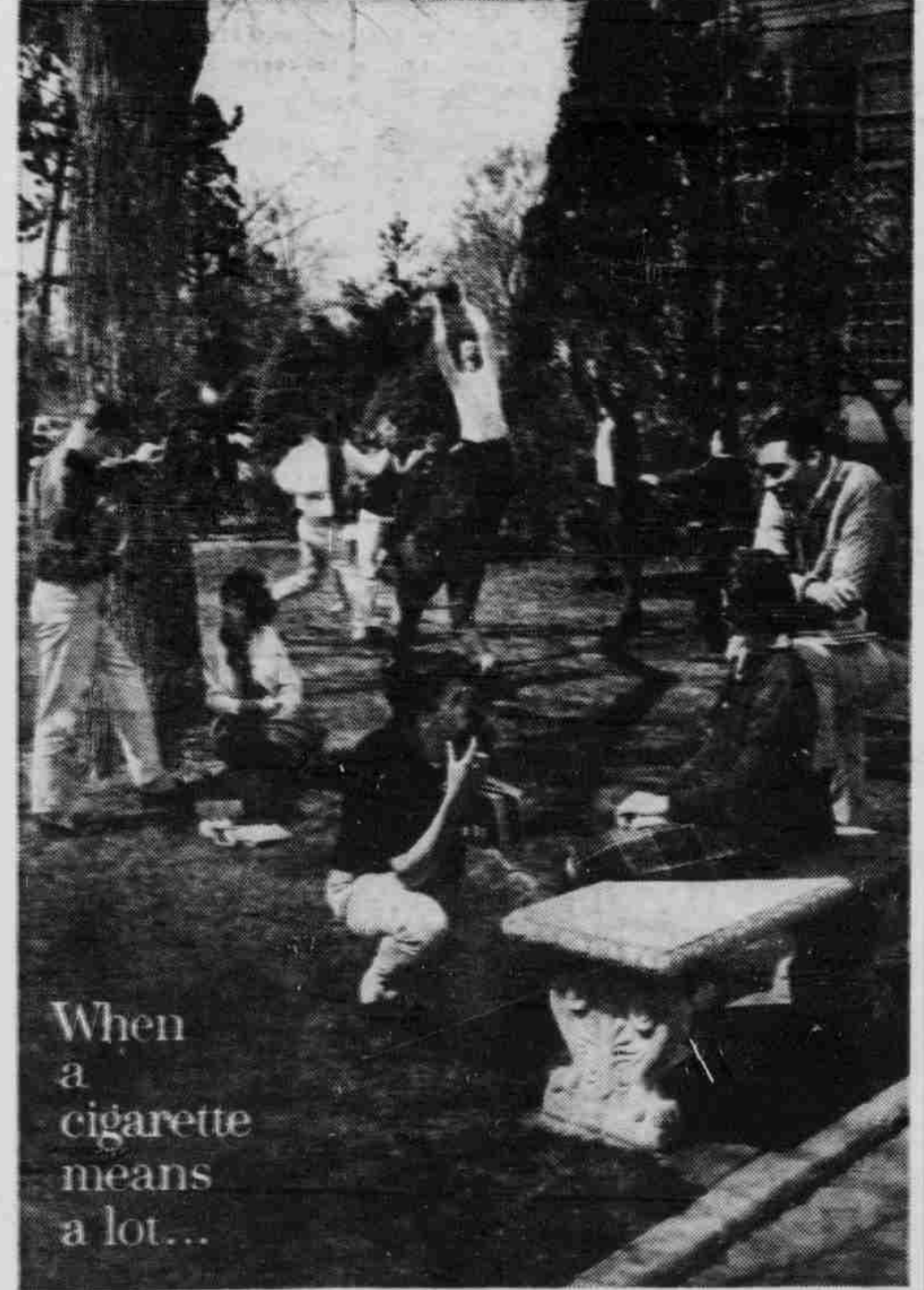
