

KUON-TV Will Present Varied Show Schedule

KUON-TV, Channel 12, the University of Nebraska's television station, has issued a preview of programs for the month of June.

The following are short sketches of the major program series:

PERSPECTIVES — One show in this series will present both sides of the birth control controversy in Canada. Expressing various points of view on the subject are James A. Pike, Protestant Episcopal Bishop; Sir Julian Huxley; Arnold Toynbee; Father Edward Sheridan, a Jesuit priest; Colin Clark, a British economist.

Another Perspective program will deal with the history, philosophy, and present position of the American conservative.

UNIVERSITY ARTIST SERIES — A special one-hour television concert features Dr. Larry Lusk of the University's Department of Music. The talented pianist performs "Tocatta No. 2 in C Major" by Bach, "Sonata in E Minor" by Haydn, "L'isle joyeuse" by Debussy, "Nocturne in E Major, Op. 62, No. 2" and "Ballade in G Minor, Op. 23" by Chopin.

On another show, Professor Audun Ravnan plays works from Beethoven, Grieg, Carl Nielsen, and Chopin.

THE RAGTIME ERA — Host Max Morath spins out a review of trends in American music during the fascinating period in American history from 1890 to 1920.

BEYOND THE EARTH — Dr. John A. Russell, professor of astronomy at the University of Southern California,

hosts a 25-part series on basic astronomy. With the aid of models, drawings, rear screen projection, and humorous anecdotes, viewers find out about our solar system and the stars — how individual stars differ in properties, how they are arranged in space, and how they move.

THE FACE OF SWEDEN — Filmed entirely in Sweden, an eight-part television series brings a searching self-portrait of a remarkable country — its people, its government, its art.

DYNAMICS OF LEADERSHIP — Five half-hour television sessions serve as the hinge of what can be a training program for more effective group action by individuals and organizations. Principles and practices of group leadership are illustrated with comment and criticism by Dr. Malcolm Knowles, associate professor of education and general consultant in adult education at Boston University.

DR. POSIN'S GIANTS — The giant minds of science are the subjects of an informative and highly entertaining series showing the modern applications of ancient theories and discoveries. Featured is Dr. Daniel Q. Posin, professor of physics at De Paul University who won an Emmy Award in 1961 as the "best educator" of the year.

FROM THE ANCIENT PAST — Interesting ideas and items of information about the ancient Near-East are presented in capsule form through pictures, artifacts, and museum objects. Co-

mentator and authority for the series is Dr. Alan Pickering, guest lecturer in the field of the Old Testament Life and Literature at the Cotner School of Religion and a popular University of Nebraska pastor.

SELF-ENCOUNTER — Dr. Hazel E. Barnes, associate professor of classics at the University of Colorado and one of America's foremost scholars and authorities on existentialist philosophy and literature, describes and illustrates this challenging new philosophy which maintains that man has a free choice of what he becomes and that "becoming" is a constant process of life.

CASALS MASTER CLASS — With the distinction of worldwide acclaim, this television series returns to Channel 12 for a repeat broadcast. In the 13-program series, the world's greatest cellist, Pablo Casals, teaches a series of master classes for young students.

YOUR UNICAMERAL — As a service to Nebraska citizens, University television cameras provide a direct close-up of the people and issues in this year's legislature. George Round of the University is host for the weekly visits as state senators appear on each program to discuss key legislative topics of concern. Current legislative actions reviewed each week by Hugo Srb, clerk of the legislature.

DYNAMICS OF DESEGREGATION — An intensive study of race relations in the United States is offered in a fifteen-program series.

Two Talks On Nebr. Scheduled

A series of two public lecture sessions on the Nebraska homesteader, where he came from, what values he brought with him and the changes he made, has been scheduled at the Nebraska Center for Continuing Education.

The discussions, open to the public, will be held this Thursday and the following Thursday, June 20, at 8:30 p.m.

Dr. Robert Manley, assistant professor of history at the University of Nebraska, will speak on "The Changing Face of Individualism," at the first session. The discussion will center on an examination of the federal government and individual autonomy.

Dr. William Aeschbacher, director of the Nebraska State Historical Society, will speak on "Old World Heritage in a Thursday evening. Dr. Aeschbacher will discuss the impact of European-born settlers on an emerging society.

The two-part lecture program is sponsored by the University of Nebraska College of Arts and Sciences.

NSF Sponsors Courses

Seventy-three high school teachers from 13 states are attending the University of Nebraska's annual Summer Science Institute which begins today and lasts until Aug. 3, according to Dr. Wendell Gauger, director.

Sponsored by the National Science Foundation, the Institute seeks to upgrade the training of the science teachers who have had only minimal training in the science subjects they teach.

Each Institute participant receives a \$600 stipend plus free tuition and an allowance of \$120 for each dependent.
