Texas Tech Invades With Top Three Back

Nebraska's revamped '63 basketball team will face a virtually unchanged Texas Tech cage team tonight at 9 p.m. on the Coliseum floor after the Huskers dropped two Big Ten tries over the weekend.

Coach Joe Cipriano's squad will try to even their record at 2-2 against the Red Raiders who will return their three top scorers from last years 68 to 66 loss to the Scarlet in the 1962 opener.

Harold Denny, a 6-8 junior, topped the Texans against Nebraska last year with 18 points and will return. Senior Sid Hall and junior Glenn Hallum complete the trio that should give Tech Coach Gene Gibson needed experience this year.

Husker Charlie Jones made the Red Raider opener his best offensive effort of '62 by drilling 30 points through Texas defenses. Jones too is back to trouble the invaders' memories.

Nebraska should fare better against Tech than they did against Michigan and Purdue on their Big Ten trip.

The nationally-ranked Spartans raked the Scarlet for a 34 to 22 half time margin and kept it for a 80 to 55 victory Friday night.

Rebounding and accuracy from the field won it for the hosts. Nebraska could hit only 24 of 63 from the floor while Michigan meshed 33 shots of 64 attempts. The Spartans used a substantial height ad-

vantage to keep Husker shooters out of the double figures. Charlie Jones led Nebraska with nine points.

At Purdue Saturday night, Nebraska improved but this time it was foul trouble and the Boilermakers capitalized from the charity line for an 81 to 57 win.

Grant Simmons led the Huskers in his third varsity start with 20 points that included seven of eleven field goals and a solid floor game. Jones pushed in 16 points and led his taller foes off the boards with 12 grabs.

But Nebraska fouled 30 times to 17 Boilermaker personal and the hosts netted 25 of 35 tries at the line while the Scarlet made good on 17 of 23. Four Huskers finished the game with four fouls on them.

Nebraska outshot Purdue from the floor with 29 baskets to 28.

NU Drops First Tiff On Fall

Nebraska lost its first wrestling meet of the season 14 to 12 to Northwest Missouri State College Friday night in Lincoln.

Each team won four matches, but Northwest Missouri's Allan Chezum pinned Chuck Clatterback in the 177-pound class to gain two extra points. Remaining matches were all decisions.

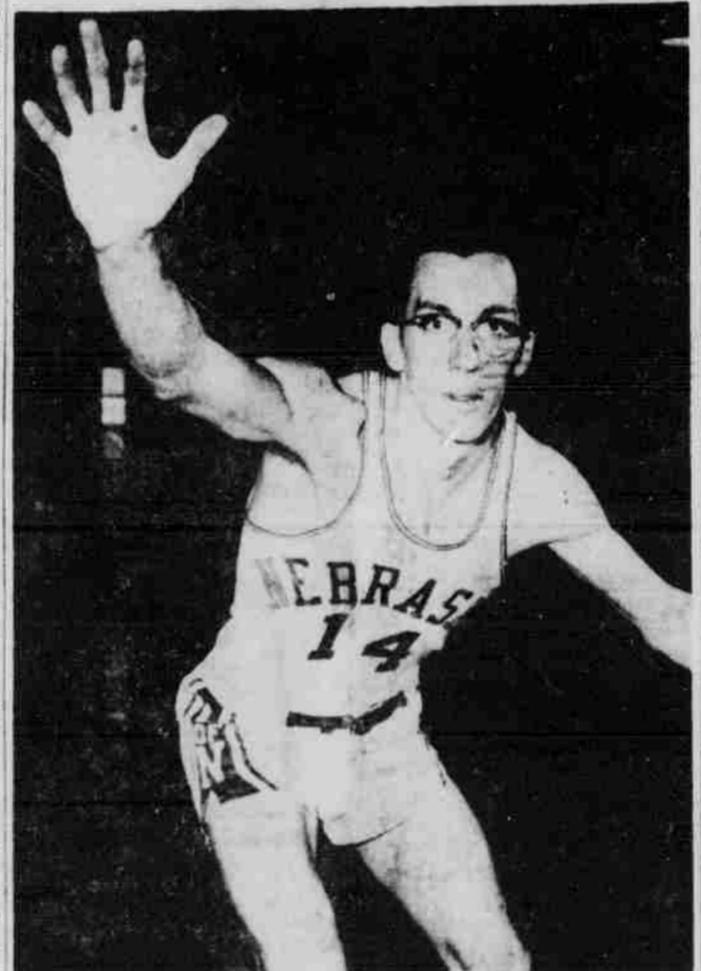
Starting its youngest team in years, Nebraska had five sophomore grapplers out of eight. Gary Richards (137), Roger Lott (Heavyweight) and Dennis Kendall (147) were making their first starts for Nebraska. Kendall decided on Lonny Wieland 6-4.

The most exciting performance came in the 167-pound match, where Nebraska's Phil McCaffrey decided Allen Packer in the allotted nine minutes. The lead changed three times.

Steve Walenz won a 4-0 decision at 123 pounds, and Chuck Martin 130 won a 5-0 decision for the Huskers.

Dr. Rose Reports—Transmitters Should Aid Athletic Study

Use of miniature FM transmitters to record the heart activity of participating athletes has produced results of interest to coaches and trainers as well as to medical men, two University of Nebraska medical researchers reported here.

3)—Give promise of usefulness in measuring the state of an athlete's training.

4)—May provide an index of peak warm-up and thereby show when an athlete is ready to perform at his best.

At Nebraska, the researchers said, their tests:

1)—Revealed a heart muscle deficiency which standard electrocardiographic tests (EKG) missed in a track man whose physical condition made vigorous sports activity inadvisable.

2)—Have proved useful in identifying physically superior athletes, both male and female.

The report was given before the American Medical Association's 5th National Conference on the Medical Aspects of Sports by Kenneth D. Rose, M.D., who conducted the studies with F. Lowell Dunn, M.D., Omaha, a pioneer in the use of radiotelemetry. Dr. Rose is Chief of the Division of Medical Research with the University of Nebraska Health Services at Lincoln, and a research associate in microbiology.

For more than two years the Nebraska researchers have been using radio-transmitted signals to study the heart activity of track men and women physical education students. The transmission equipment weighs less than two pounds and can be carried by the test subject while he performs. The standard EKG is designed to test while the subject is "at rest."

The Nebraska studies, Dr. Rose said, indicate that the positioning of the electrode on the body of the performing subject can make considerable difference in the results obtained. He suggested that international standardized positioning be inaugurated to permit comparison of results obtained.

The field of cardiovascular research is expanding so rapidly since the advent of the tiny transistor, he said, that it is time to develop acceptable standard procedures.

Deadline For Track Meet Now

The deadline for the intramural indoor track and field meet is today at 5 p.m. Entry blanks should be turned into the intramurals office in the Men's Physical Education Building.

Each organization is limited to two men per event, but there is no limit to unattached individuals. Each man is limited to three running events plus relays, but there is no restriction on field events.

The best six men in each class, Fraternity and Independent, will qualify for the finals, Tuesday, January 14, at 7:00 p.m. Preliminaries begin at the East Stadium indoor track tomorrow at 7 p.m.

Track lettermen and squad members of the basketball, wrestling, gymnastics, and swimming teams are ineligible to compete.

Scoring for the first six places will be 14, 10, 8, 6, 4, and 2 points in relays. In other events, the first six places will be worth 7, 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 points respectively.

Defending champions are Delta Tau Delta (fraternity) and Seaton II (Burr-Selleck). Last year's individual champions are LeRoy Flock of Alpha Gamma Rho and Gus Shaw of Bessey.

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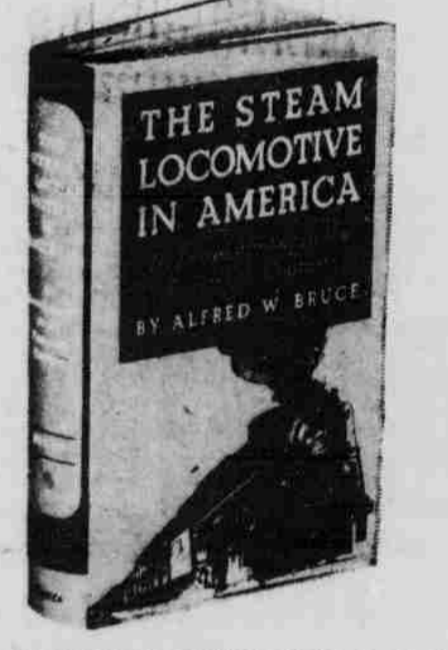
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
