NU Coach Observes Brown's Weight Makes Difference—Better Than Before

Ordinarily when a football player gains weight he slows down—hence an unhappy coach.

But that's not the case with Nebraska's All America guard Bob Brown, who'll lead a big, mobile Husker forward wall—also featuring All Big 8 tackle Lloyd Voss—against an equally fine Auburn club in the Orange Bowl.

Big Bob has been commuting between Nebraska and the East coast since the close of the regular season. His first jaunt was to be honored as a member of the America Coaches Association-TV Guide All America team; the second trip was to accept similar honors (along with Auburn's great quarterback Jimmy Sidle, by the way) as a member of the Football Writers Association of America-Look Magazine All America team.

When the Cornhuskers resumed workouts Monday, Brown weighed in at a trim 289. Trim? Yes sir, said de-

fensive line coach George Kelly, despite the fact that Bob was officially weighed in September at 269.

Of course, the 6-4½ linebacker and pulling guard actually gained weight during the regular season.

"He'd range from 272 to 285," Kelly said.

Naturally, the big question in the Husker camp was: Has Brown slowed down?

"Are you kidding?" Kelly grinned. "He's running faster—and quicker—than he has all season. Bob looks and moves like he is in great shape and he's just like all the other players—really anxious to play Auburn in the Orange Bowl."

Brown's list of post-season honors will grow again on Saturday night. He'll be in Washington, D.C., to receive the Pigskin Club's award as the 1963 Lineman of the Year. Navy quarterback Roger Staubach will be feted as Back of the Year. Brown was the No. 1 draft choice of the NFL Philadelphia Eagles and the AFL Denver Broncos. Voss, by the way, was the first round choice of NFL Green Bay and

second round draftee of the AFL New York Jets.

In addition to the Look and TV Guide teams, Brown has also been named to the following All America squads: Associated Press, United Press International, CBS Television and the Sporting News.

Weaker Houston To Test Huskers

Even though the University of Houston is not expected to fare as well as last season's 15 and 11 campaign, they should provide a stiff test to slumping Nebraska tomorrow night at the Coliseum.

Lyle Harger, the leading scorer and rebounder for the independent Cougars the last two years, has graduated, but six lettermen have returned. Don Scherak, 6'4", averaged 15 points per game last season.

Other senior lettermen are 5'11" Chet Oliver, 5'10" Reno Lifschutz, 6'7" DeWayne Bond, and 6'5" Don Eckelman. Junior Jack Margent-

Kelly, a grin creasing his genial Irish mug and shaking his head as Brown wheeled out of the line and tore down field during a workout, summed up the unanimous feeling about Bob Brown: "Boy, that big lug is really something to see."

haler averaged only 4.1 points per game last year but may see some action.

Like Nebraska, Houston will probably rely heavily on young players. Promising sophomores are Richard Apolakis (13.5 points per game last year), Dennis Neumann (12.9), and Joe Hamood (12.2).

Houston hopes for help from three junior college transfers, led by 5'5" Herbert Johnson, who averaged (how's that again?) 33.5 points per game last year. Warren Young (6'7") averaged 19 points per game in junior-college competition and 6'5" Jim Jones 16 points.

Allen, Albers Score High

Swimmers Ready Initial Dual Meet

Nebraska gymnast Francis Allen of Lincoln, a junior, won the parallel bars championship at the Midwest Open Gymnastics tournament in Chicago.

Allen topped 28 entries in the All Around Division, then took top honors in competition between the first six place entrants in the All Around and Specialists Division. Dennis Albers, Hastings junior, placed second in side horse and sixth in free exercise. He finished seventh in the All Around race.

The Nebraska swimming team will make its debut in dual meet competition against the University of Iowa at Iowa City Saturday. Nebraska beat the Hawkeyes 1 a s t year during the early season, but Iowa has a slightly better team this year.

"Our squad was physically ready for this meet a week ago, and I hope they have retained the edge," said Coach Dick Klass. "Iowa usually comes up with a surprise or two, and they are especially strong in diving; an event in which Nebraska lacks depth."

Senior Co-captains Bill Henry and Bill Fowles will lead the Husker hopes, and many sophomores will be counted on for points.

Isaacson To Meet Huskers On Mat?

The Great Plains Open Wrestling Championships will be held in Pershing Auditorium Friday and Saturday. Teams from 42 schools have been invited to compete.

Thirty University of Nebraska matmen, including 13 lettermen, will compete for the Huskers according to Coach Mancuso. The Huskers will compete unattached in the open tournament.

Harold Thompson, the Big Eight Champion in the 157 pound division is one of outstanding ex-huskers to be competing. Mike Nissen, 1963 NCAA Champion, will miss the contest because of work.

Air Force Academy's Terry Isaacson may return to Lincoln in wrestling togs. Isaacson, who led Air Force to a 17-14 win over the Huskers this fall, might not be present due to the Falcon post season bowl commitment.

Isaacson was second in the NCAA in 1962, fourth in the NCAA in 1963, Great Plains Champion in 1961 and was awarded the Sportsmanship Trophy in the Great Plains for 1962. Isaacson wrestled in the 157 pound division.
