Trzcinski, Alum To Work At MIT

Dr. Louis Trzcinski, associate professor of string instruments, will spend several days of Christmas vacation in the laboratories of Dr. Harold E. Edgerton at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology where the two men are working on new techniques for teaching music.

Edgerton, a graduate of the University, is known as the father of electronic flash photography.

They are using the most modern of electronic gadgets, high speed stroboscopic lights, special cameras and film and motion picture devices in their work.

The two professors are attracting the attention of music teachers, artists and motion picture authorities throughout the world. For the past two years they have been producing pictures for publication in music texts.

Their latest work, still in the experimental stages, is the development of a special motion picture device which will allow the student violinist to practice alone, by studying the movements of famous artists flashed on a screen.

Sheldon Displays Alumni Paintings

Six University alumni will display paintings at a special exhibit in the Sheldon Memorial Art Gallery Jan. 7-Feb. 2.

Some of the artists are painting full-time while others are teaching art, according to Norman Geske, director of the Gallery.

More than 65,000 persons toured the Sheldon Memorial Art Gallery during the first months of operation.

Norman Geske, director of the Gallery, said it now appears that attendance will reach 100,000 persons by the end of the first year. The Gallery opened May 15, 1963.

"Many people are paying return visits because there is a new exhibition every month," Geske said. "In addition, there are many public lectures in the Gallery which are of general interest."
