# Physics Honorary Installed

Nebraska industrialist W. D. Behlen of Columbus was a guest of honor last night when the University installed a new chapter of Sigma Pi Sigma, national physics honor society.

## Effort And Understanding Called Key To Progress

Lots of effort and improved understanding are needed to break down the barriers of progress in developing countries, a University physicist declared last night.

"We will not solve the problems of developing countries with fancy formulas," Dr. Paul Byerly, Jr., told those attending installation ceremonies for the new chapter of Sigma Pi Sigma, national physics honor society at the University.

He returned last year from a five-year assignment with the Agency for International Development. During the five years he worked with research and science education programs in the Philippines and Taiwan.

"The Peace Corps provides an example of what can be done when people with ingenuity and understanding apply themselves in developing countries. The effect would be tremendous if you could bring about a two-way exchange involving larger numbers of people between various countries," Byerly said.

He noted many differences in the countries he visited in

tion made possible the construction of a new physics research laboratory which opens next fall.

Sigma Pi Sigma chapters are restricted to colleges and universities of recognized standing which offer a strong physics major. Membership is conferred on the basis of scholarship and professional record.

"The University chapter of Sigma Pi Sigma is being established because of the growing number of students majoring in physics," said Dr. E. J. Zimmerman, chairman of the department of physics.

The main address of the installation program was given by Dr. Paul Byerly, Jr., associate professor of physics at the University.

Installation ceremonies for the new chapter, members and officers were held yesterday at the Nebraska Center for Continuing Education.

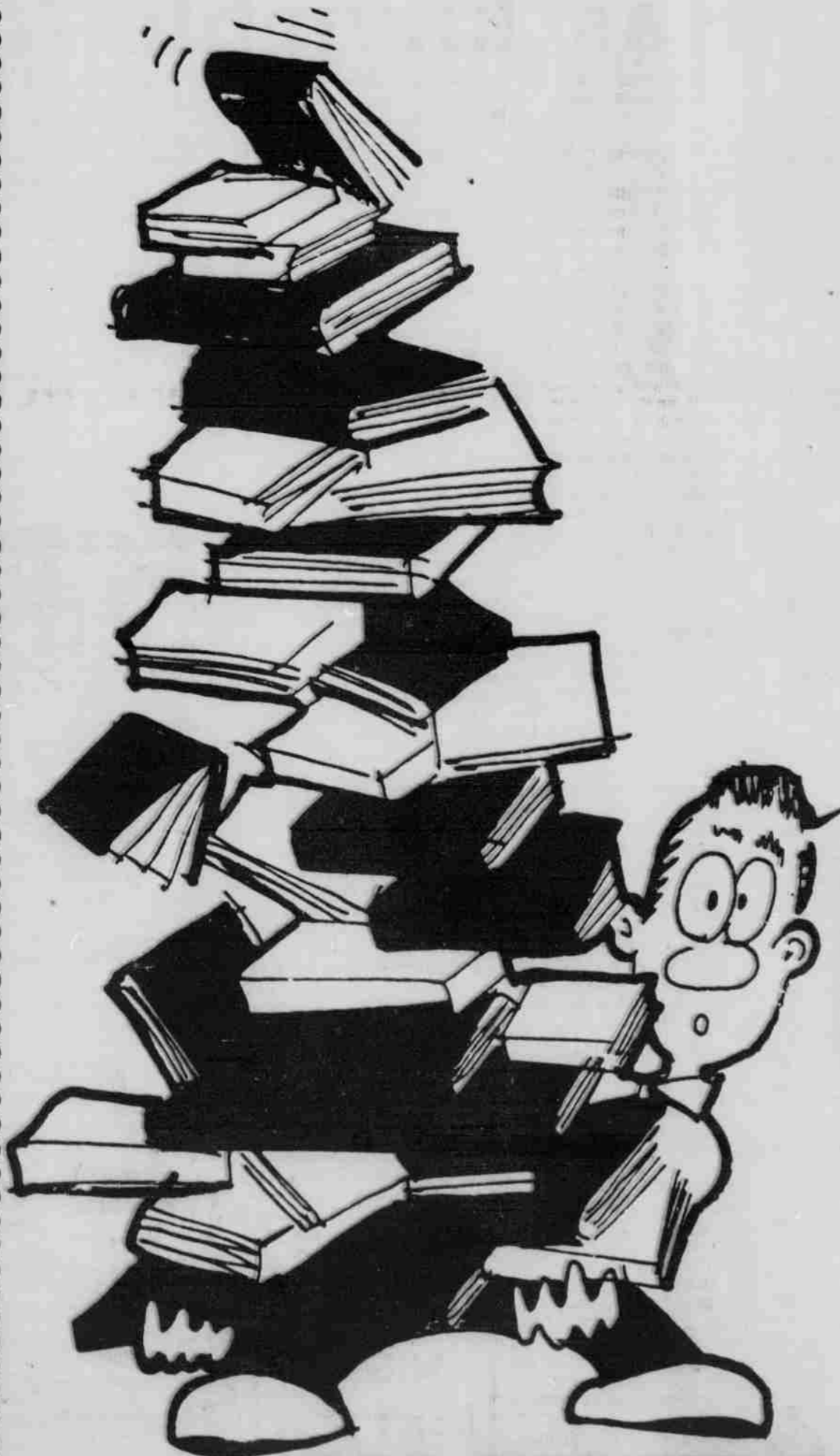
