Mr. Treasurer Weill Has Enviably Record

Part of the enviable record compiled by Outstanding Nebraskan Dick Weill is the unique fact that he has served as treasurer for six campus organizations.

During his four years at the University, Weill has kept books for Phi Eta Sigma, Sigma Alpha Mu, Delta Sigma Rho, Student Council, Corn Cobs and the Innocents Society.

An accounting major, Weill ranks second in his class in the College of Business Administration and has the top scholastic average in his accounting class. In addition to balancing books, he was Student Council vice president and participated in speech and debate for four years with many honors.

"I really enjoyed these activities," Weill said yesterday during a DAILY NEBRASKAN interview in which he lived up to the title (from the letter which nominated him for the honor) of "one of the most articulate members of the University community."

"I enjoyed both oratory and debate, but I was more successful in oratory." During his sophomore year, Weill was ranked in the top three speakers in all but one of the contests in which he participated.

One of 20 national winners of a Root-Tilden Scholarship to study law at New York University, Weill is content to let the future take care of itself. "At the moment I'm interested in corporation and tax law or possibly some aspect of government service."

An astute campus politician whose record speaks for itself, Weill said he is not interested in entering politics after graduating.

When asked if he would seek his future in Nebraska, Weill, who is from Lincoln, said "I think former Gov. Val Peterson had the best answer to that question at the Master's News Conference when he said 'Go where the opportunity is.' If I were fortunate to have an opportunity to come back to Nebraska, I would."

Weill viewed Student Council as the project which most completely captured his interest "although debating was very satisfying."

"Student Council always has the aspect of the unexpected, for example the variety between an angry sorority protesting a shortage of football tickets and the rewarding evaluation of the Masters Program."

"Student Council has now reached a turning point. President John Lydick and his execs will have to come to grips with something that those in the past have sidestepped."

"Because Council members and leaders are transient, they have an obligation to the University to provide vigorous leadership. The only just reward for activities is the betterment of the University. Activity points and glory are empty honors when the good of the University is secondary."

Weill said that a major failing of students in activities is that they fear to express an opinion. "Fear of criticism stifles opinion," he said. "But if you don't make a few mistakes in college, you don't learn anything. As far as Council is concerned, I probably made more mistakes than anyone."

"But controversy for controversy's sake alone is valueless. Having an opportunity and speaking it is the only way progress will come."

Suddenly changing his topic, Weill said, "Can I talk about fraternities?" and proceeded the present four year's experienced knowledge of the successes and failures of the Greek system.

"Since I've been at school the fraternity system has made tremendous progress. Pledge training is constructive, fraternities have realized their obligation to community service and scholastics have taken on renewed emphasis."

"All of these steps are in the right direction and yet, for the system to continue in the light of growing dormitory complexes, their present attitudes must be reevaluated. Fraternities cannot hope to dominate the campus, but they have to work as partners with non-fraternity members to develop the best University."

"In the end, they must be able to answer the question, 'Why should I belong to a fraternity rather than living in that beautiful new dormitory?'"

Weill defined his greatest disappointment at the University as the fact that, in his opinion, he did not get full value from the classes he has taken. "It is typical that students learn only as much as they have to pass the examinations. Only afterwards do we wish we'd gone deeper."

Another point Weill especially wanted to talk about is the "unfounded criticism" of his college. "The College of Business Administration is as challenging as any and for those that are interested in some aspect of business it is the logical place. In the end, outside of engineering students, business graduates have some of the best opportunities for real fine jobs."

Concerning his choice of accounting, Weill said he was undecided when he came to the University as a freshman.

"Since that time I was fortunate enough to get a job with the accounting firm of Miller and Moore. If it weren't for the chance to study law which the scholar-

ship has provided, I could have found public accounting a very interesting profession."

"This University has gotten tougher in four years. And that is good. They're demanding a lot more from freshmen in both regular and honors courses than they did of my class."

"In the end, this is no more than an academic community and every attempt should be made to keep it that way. In four years I couldn't help but be astounded with the excellence of our faculty."

In his infrequent spare time, Weill plays handball and tennis. "Judy takes up a lot of time, too."

"Judy" is Weill's pinmate, Judy Brumm. "I met her at the Ag Campus barbeque when we were freshmen, and we were both on the debate squad. Yes, the Ag Barbecue ..."

Miss Brumm has accepted a teaching job in Oyster Bay, Long Island.

Weill expressed an enthusiastic optimistic outlook when he said, in conclusion, "Life comes day by day and you play each day as it comes. Half of life is luck."

Traffic Injuries Result From Fire

Three women were injured yesterday afternoon as a fire truck which was answering a call to Cather Hall collided at 14th and F Streets with a car driven by Linda A. Glantz.

Miss Glantz, 18, who suffered back and head injuries, was listed late yesterday in fair condition at St. Elizabeth's Hospital. The two passengers in her car, Dorothy Blessing and Coy Copley, were treated for minor injuries and released.

The fire at Cather Hall, which was in the trash chute, was extinguished before the fire trucks arrived on the scene. The fire had apparently been caused by a smoldering cigarette.

The fire truck, driven by Kenneth Williams, was headed east on F Street. The car driven by Miss Glantz was going south on 14th. She apparently did not see the fire truck coming.

The Glantz car continued south, struck a car on the east side of 14th, then swerved back and struck a car on the west side of 14th. Both cars were unoccupied.
