

Borgialli To Coach Wrestling

Orval Borgialli, a high school coach at Lusk, Wyo., will succeed Bob Mancuso as the University wrestling coach.

Athletic Director Tippy Dye announced the appointment Friday following the Regents meeting.

Borgialli is a 1959 graduate of Chadron State Teachers College.

A native of Newcastle, Wyo., Borgialli played football three years at Chadron and as a senior was instrumental in launching an intercollegiate wrestling program at that school. He taught the sport and also competed.

The new Husker coach, who will also teach physical education, currently is completing work on his master's degree at Colorado State Col-

lege in Greeley. At Lusk High School, Borgialli was an assistant football coach in addition to coaching wrestling and serving on the faculty. Last winter, Borgialli coached two state champions -heavyweight Tom Thompson and Mike Kinney. Two others on his team, Allen Butler and Doyle Davies, ranked 4th and 3rd in the

state, respectively. Borgialli and his wife, Carol, have two children, Susan, 5, and Merlen, 3.






