Coeds Invade ROTC Units

The feminine touch is added to Reserve Officer Training Corps units by two auxiliaries, Angel Flight and Cadence Countesses.

Angel Flight is the official auxiliary of the Air Force ROTC. It was founded two years ago at the University to promote an interest in the Air Force and in the advanced program for career officers.

Angle Flight members serve as hostesses for the AFROTC, and are now official hostesses at Municipal Airport.

Each spring they sponsor a Blue Yonder workshop for anyone interested in learning about the Air Force way of life. Speakers from the base, and movies of overseas tours of duties are part of the program.

Several members attend national conclaves, and one or two area conclaves are held each year in Lincoln.

Other activities include tours of bases, of the headquarters of the Strategic Air Command at Omaha, and of a missile site at Eagle.

A tea is given each spring for graduating Air Force cadets.

Angel Flight is interested primarily in promoting service opportunities for the men in ROTC, and educating the women who may be connected with the Air Force, and the public in general about the Air Force, said Suzie Trammell, publicity director.

Selection of new members is made by an interviewing board of Angel Flight and Arnold Air Society members. Angel Flight is sponsored locally by Arnold Air Society.

Cadence Countesses, the honorary adjunct to the Pershing Rifles, was founded here at the University five years ago.

The national champion drill team is making plans now to attend the Cherry Blossom Festival in Washington D.C. April 15.

Several money-making projects are underway, but the members are hoping to find an inexpensive way to travel to Washington.

"We're determined to get

there," Patty Johns, president, said. "We feel it's a good way to give recognition to Nebraska."

The Cadence Countesses won national honors at Madison, Wisconsin last year, and are planning to attend the regional contest in Champaign, Ill., again this year. They are also regional champions.

Pershing Rifles originated and sponsors the drill team. In return, the Cadence Countess members help the Pershing Rifles by giving speeches during rush, and serving as hostesses.

Pershing Rifle members trained girls during try-outs, and select a sponsor to attend a regional drill meet who is Miss Pershing Rifles.
