Regents **Scholars** Revealed

Twelve Nebraska high school seniors, led by two scholars from Omaha Westside and Omaha Creighton high schools, earned a place on the 1965 Regents All-State Scholastic Team, the University announced yesterday.

The first-Team members were selected solely on scores in the recent University Regents' examination taken by 7,054 seniors n 435 schools.

Captain of the team is David Sheppard, of Omaha Westside. He ranked first in the state-wide competition which is given only to those seniors in the upper third of their class.

As Missile Commander

Capt. Leon Kroenke, a university graduate participated in the latest successful launch of a U.S. Air Force Minuteman ballistic missile from Vandenberg AFB, Calif.

SAC keeps the nation's intercontinental missiles and bombers on constant jet alert.

The live launch here marked the first time these SAC missile combat crewmen actually had fired a Minuteman. The shot was one in a series of firings being conducted by SAC combat crews who come to Vandenberg on temporary duty to launch the missiles.
