some beforehand experience, hours in the graduate college, and closer counceling."

'There is no emphasis on counting hours, and we are not skipping or shortcutting anything; what we do is prepare the superior student so he is more capable of handling the work of graduate college. We prepare him so he can handle the usual program required.'

The specific aspects of the program are to give the student early experience in research, and early experience in the problems of college teaching.

McCashland said, "I hope to see this program expand-The student's undergraduate and graduate programs ed. are integrated so he can get started earlier in the things that are important."

We have an enthusiastic support on the part of the staff, and already, in only two years of function, some of the desirable features have been made a part of the regular program."


