> If large tractors are excluded from the tests, other manufacturers may ask for exemptions too, according to Prof George Steinbruegge of the Tractor Testing Laboratory.

The result, ne said, would be the deterioration of the tractor testing program that has won world-wide attention. Supporting LB552, the Nebraska Heavy Equipment Dealers Association said that very few, if any, heavy construction-type tractors h a v e been tested at the laboratory since 1959.

They have argued that the test is meaningless because manufacturers have extended the warranty period on their equipment and have provided manufacturing programs that are more rugged than the Nebraska test.



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
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
