NROTC Instructor Given Air Medal

A Navy destroyer officer, Lt. David Bennett was awarded an air medal for services in Viet Nam in ceremonies Tuesday afternoon at the University.

Capt. A. C. Mullen, professor of Naval Science at the University, presented the medal "for meritorious achievement in aerial flight as an observer during missions in support of combat operations in Viet Nam from Nov., 1964 to May, 1965."

Lt. Bennett's mission was to spot the Viet Cong and mark targets which required flying in small, unarmed planes at altitudes of 20 to 1500 feet. On two different occasions his aircraft was hit by enemy fire and crashed.

Lt. Bennett is now the navigation instructor and junior class advisor with the Naval ROTC unit at the University.

Czech Loan Fund Aids 153 Students

A student loan fund established to memorialize the Czech pioneers who settled in this country has assisted 153 University students since it was inaugurated three years ago.

Val Kuska of Lincoln, vice chairman of the fund, said slightly more than \$20,000 has been collected from persons of Czech descent who live in Nebraska or are former Nebraskans. He said efforts are being made to increase the fund.

Established in the University Foundation, the fund assists University students regardless of race, creed or color. Not an outright gift, the

loans must be repaid after the student leaves school, Kuska said.
