## Students To Talk On Mexican Stay

Spend the year studying at a Mexican university, visiting the natives and speaking Spanish.

It can be done. Living proof will be presented Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. in the Nebraska Union auditorium by students who have taken part in the Latin American Studies Program.

University students who have studied under the program at El Colegio de Mexico in Mexico City the past two years will explain requirements and procedures to interested students.

Dr. Roberto Esquenazi-Mayo, chairman of the Romance Languages Department and director of the study program, said this particular Mexican college is a "very exclusive type of institution from an economic point of view."

Susie Rutter, a University student, attended the school for a year, from February to the middle of June and from July to November two years ago.

She said the college is divided into five centers: language and linguistics, international relations, history, economics and Far Eastern studies.

Classes meet three times a week, in addition to a seminar, Miss Rutter said. There are no textbooks. Students are given a bibliography of books and must do their own research.

Emphasizing that the college is very competitive, Miss Rutter said that a class of 30 may end up being a class of 14 by the end of the three-year term of study for most regular students.

She said many of the students were graduate students, and those in international relations, "knew they would go back to their country to assume positions in their government."

Vicki Weber, who returned from Mexico this year, said she found it somewhat difficult to adjust to having all classes in Spanish. She emphasized that the studies program is not limited to Spanish majors, but that students should have a good knowledge of the language.

She noted that often American students had to defend United States policy. If one does not know about a certain U.S. policy "it can be very embarrassing," at the school, she said.

## Mono Rate Rockets; Research Continues

Every year the University is attacked by a mysterious plague which runs rampant through all of the students regardless of sex, age or class ranking.

This strange infection is many times called "the kissing disease," but is technically infectious mononucleosis (mono).

"We have discovered an unusually high rate of mono this fall," commented Dr. K. D. Rose, chief of medical laboratories at the University Health Center.

A medical-journal report on mono among Smith College

girls observed that the highest peaks came in the months following Christmas, spring and summer vacations.

Colonel Robert J. Hoagland, formerly medical officer at West Point, has noticed an increase in the ailment every February and August, which is about the time the cadets get back from their semi-annual vacations.
