

Third Straight Shutout . . . Huskers Tame Wildcats

The Husker scoring machine stayed in high gear Saturday as Nebraska rolled over Kansas State in a 41-0 victory at Manhattan. The win boosted the scarlet season record to 5-0 and was their third straight shutout.

After the Wildcat defense had held the Huskers to a scoreless first quarter, Harry Wilson smashed through the line and scored from 11 yards out with four seconds gone in the second quarter.

This was all the Huskers needed as they rolled on to a 21-0 halftime margin and

added three more tallies in the second half to account for their point total.

Fred Duda engineered the drives with some nifty running and passing to spark the Huskers. Duda had a first quarter 26 yard touchdown run called back because of a clipping penalty. The Huskers were able to capitalize on Wildcat miscues in the hard played game, taking a short punt and a fumble recovery by John Stroymyer in for touchdowns.

Charlie "Cho Cho" Winters accounted for two of the second half touchdowns, while Tatman added the other, giving him an afternoon

total of two.

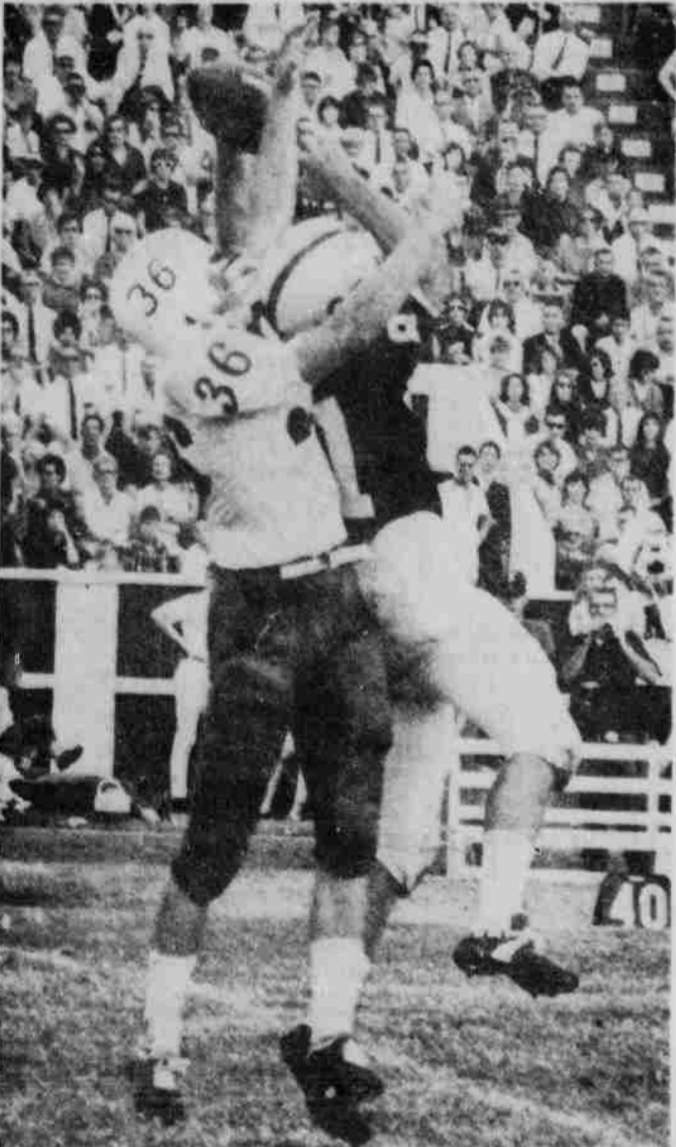
The Black Shirts contained the Wildcat attack, limiting them to seven first downs and 72 yards rushing. Vic Castillo, the league's leading yardage passer, was able to connect only on three of 15 for 36 yards in the Husker secondary.

For the afternoon the Wildcats completed six out of 23 attempts for 71 yards. One of the Wildcats passes was pirated by Marv Mueller, who returned it 14 yards, the longest non-scoring run of the season.

Linebacker Mike Kennedy was added to the shoulder injury list. Kennedy was injured in the first half of the game and sat out the rest of the game with ice packs on his shoulder.

Kansas State held leading punt returner Larry Wachholtz in check with high spiraling punts and downfield coverage. Wachholtz added three extra points while Ted Vactor accounted for two. Duncan Drum missed on his attempt.

The game included several firsts as Tony Jeter strengthened the defensive end corps, turning in a respectable performance in the final half. Another first was a Ben Gregory pass to Larry Casey which almost went all the way in the fourth quarter.

Colorado Manages Tie; Arkansas Over Texas

While Nebraska cruised over Kansas State as expected, the rest of the Big Eight was involved in some mild surprises.

The Huskers next opponent, Colorado, had to battle back at Boulder to gain a 10-10 tie with spunky Iowa State.

The Buffs scrambled back from a 10-7 deficit in the closing minute and drove close enough for Frank Rogers to kick a 33 yard field goal which salvaged the tie with 21 seconds left.

Sophomore Quarterback Gene Cagle scored all three touchdowns as Oklahoma broke its losing streak in a 21-7 victory over winless Kansas.

Missouri scraped up two last period TD's on long kick returns to gain a 14-14 draw with a stout UCLA squad.

Oklahoma State ran into the Texas Tech last minute scoring machine and became the third successive team to succumb to the Red Raider's late in the game, 17-14.

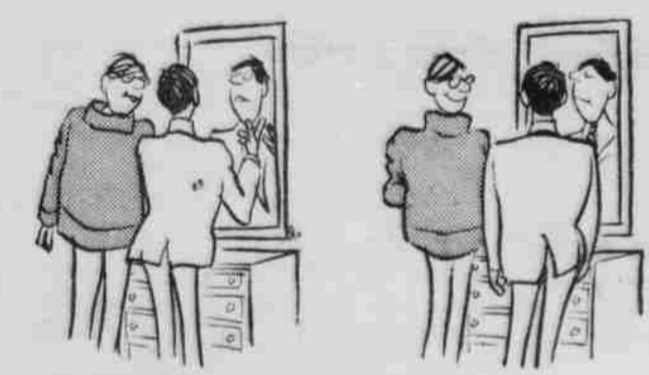
