"This is an initial step designed to get descriptive data about our students," Brown explained. "This information will help us evaluate the total impact of university life on students and offer us an opportunity to see where the University can improve its

Allen described the Institutional Research Department's job as that of a "continuing study of the University and the assembling of information helpful to management at a variety of levels and to provide an objective look at what is going on within the Univer-

Allen also said the student information form is actually the new application for admission form that will be used beginning next year and the program is only one of many research studies the department is making.


