

The fire at Abel hall Tuesday night was probably caused by a pile-up of paper in the closed trash chutes, according to Roger Doerr, student assistant in Abel Hall.

"A set fire would have blazed," Doerr said, "but Tuesday's fire was the smoldering type."

The Lincoln fire department said Thursday that the official investigation as to the cause of the fire continues.

Residents of the dorm have offered their cooperation in strengthening protective measures in the building, according to Lincoln officials.

Other developments include having the trash chutes locked except for a period for residents to dispose of trash, and the development of plans to provide temporary shelter in one of the other dorms for Abel residents in other buildings during fire alarms.

# Initiative Unlikely

Syrian forecasts of imminent hostilities with Israel are received with surprised doubts in Israel.

Students of Middle Eastern affairs doubt that Syria could face Israel alone even though it is the second power. They also doubt that such a conflict would spread to other Arab states.

Syria's land forces are estimated at 65,000 men with an Air Force of 10,000 and a Navy of 1,500. The country's two armored brigades are equipped with 200 Soviet T-34 light tanks and 150 T-54 medium light tanks.

The Syrian Air Force is estimated at 50 MIG 17's and 40-50 MIG 21's. The latter number is expected to increase when Moscow delivers the "hardware" of a recent new arms deal with

Egypt is reluctant to have a military showdown with Israel at this time because of the Egyptian involvement in Yemen, Nassar is on record as wanting to choose the day of decisive battle with Israel himself, a day when he feels that an Arab victory is as-

Iraq's forces are needed because of renewed unrest among the Kurdish minority. Baghdad itself is torn by incessant internal dissension. Lebanon has always been anxious to keep out of military involve-


