Student Bill Of Rights

The following is a copy of the Student Bill of Rights which will be discussed by the Student Assembly Sunday at 3:00 p.m. at the Nebraska Union.

Preamble: In order to affirm and to guarantee to the students of the University of Nebraska those conditions indispensable to the achievement of total education in a democratic society, the Association of Students of the University of Nebraska hold the following rights among those essential to the complete development of the student as an individual and as a responsible citizen of that society.

1. The right of every person to be considered for admission to the University of Nebraska and student organizations of that University, without regard for or inquiry into the applicant's race, color, national origin, religion, creed, or political beliefs.
2. The right of students upon entering the University of Nebraska to a clear and concise statement of their contractual rights and obligations and of their responsibilities to the University of Nebraska.
3. The right of students to maintain representative democratic self-government.
4. The right of ASUN to have the right to exist as a government.
5. Are students capable of self-government?
6. What about AWS?
7. The right of students, individual or in association with other individuals, to engage freely in off-campus activities and obligations and responsibilities as citizens of the community, state, and nation, provided they do not claim to be officially representing the University of Nebraska.
8. The right of students to choose their living environment.
9. What about the double standard?
10. Regent's rules concerning housing?
11. Off-campus housing?
12. The right of every student to exercise his full rights and responsibilities as a citizen in forming and participating in campus, local, state, national, and international organizations and to publish and disseminate his views and those of his organization on or off campus.
13. The right of students to determine who shall have access to either their academic or non-academic records.
14. Academic and non-academic records kept separate.
15. Should everyone have access to these records?
16. Are the records students' property?
17. Draft board requests.
18. The right of students to establish and petition proper channels for changes in curriculum, faculty, and/or policy.
19. The right of students to fair and impartial proceedings with substantive and procedural due process of the law in disciplinary matters.
20. The right of students who incur penalties prescribed by civil authorities for violation of the law to be free from institutional authority which is used merely to duplicate the function of general laws, only where the institution's interests as an academic community are distinct from those of the general community should the special authority of the institution be asserted.
21. The right of all students to participate in student activities of the University of Nebraska.

Utah Students Petition Legislature, Oppose Book Tax

(CPS)—Student lobbyists at the University of Utah have prepared their first proposal for the state legislature — removal of the state sales tax on textbooks.

The Legislative Relations Committee, formed last December by the student government, plans to urge the legislature to amend a state law regulating tax exemptions on sales to government, religious and charitable organizations.

John Kesler, author of the proposed amendment, said that while state-owned educational institutions are required by law to pay sales taxes on books, religious groups are exempt.

The amendment, which would not apply to non-educational items sold by the college bookstore, is based on the principle that education should not be taxed.
