

Oklahoma State Still On Top After Sweeping 3 From NU

Oklahoma State stayed atop the Big Eight baseball heap by sweeping three games from the University of Nebraska at Stillwater this weekend.

The Cornhuskers dropped a pair of games Friday and a third Saturday. The Cowboys edged Nebraska 3-1 and 4-1 Friday and shut them out 3-0 Saturday.

Formula Works
A time-worn formula employed by Oklahoma State is proving out again this year as the Cowboys find themselves right back in the thick of another Big Eight conference title race.

Standing in the league lead at 8-1, it is the same as last year, when the Cowboys were on their way to the Big Eight title and second-place finish in the

NCAA's College World Series with a team wrecked by graduation and premature pro signings.

It could be a pitchers' game or a hitters' game, but still the right players come through, whether it be in a 1-0 game that goes 18 innings, or an 8-7 slugfest. The biggest margin in an Oklahoma State game this year had been 3-1. The fact the Pokes stay close helps Bryan make his big point.

Attitude Is
"To me, attitude is everything," says Bryan. "Whoever wins it (this year's Big Eight title), will be the one with the best team attitude," he predicts. Last year, and apparently again this year, the Cowboys figured they could win—and they did. Pitching is still the Cow-

boys' strong point, with a staff earned-run average of 1.96, a mark which ranks third in the league. Sophomores have been the key. In fact, one of last year's Pokes stalwarts, Richard Rank, hasn't been able to get off the rubber yet as he watches sophomores Bill Maxwell, Richard Schmidt, and Bill Dobbs. The veteran leader is Larry Burchart. Maxwell, Schmidt, and Burchart all rank among the league's top eight pitchers.

When Needed
Just that deep, eighth, among the hitters is Dan Thompson, a sophomore shortstop who has the best Pokes Conference mark, a healthy .417. However, he is the only Oklahoma State listed among the top 17. As a team, the Cowboys are

hitting .223, but the hits have been coming when needed.

At least a portion of the individual hitting lead for the Big Eight stays in Kansas again this week. The honor moves over to Kansas State with Jim Brown, who is tied with Oklahoma's Gary Harper at .545. Brown, touted early as a swift defensive player, has held his starting spot with six safeties in 11 tries. The fullback on the Sooner football team, Harper also has six for 11 matches his hit total with runs plated.

The frosh netmen slammed Midwestern College, 9-0, winning all six singles and three doubles matches. Only John Hendry needed a third set to capture his victory.

Hendry prevailed over Midwestern's Pete Sheffield 6-4, 7-9, 6-4. The other victorious Cornhuskers were Dave Whitefield, Tom Wiese, William Fink, Pat Tully and Denny Bloom.

Midwestern also found it tough going against the Huskers on the baseball diamond, losing both ends of a doubleheader, 3-4 and 3-11.

Catcher Jack Galusha provided the power in the first game, blasting a three-run homer in Nebraska's half of the sixth inning.

The rest of Coach Clayton Luther's team joined Galusha in the second game in a 12-hit assault on the Midwestern moundmen.

Galusha, Don Davern, Tom Tibball and Terry Cameron each collected two hits in the 11-3 slaughter.

Mike Aspen and Mick Logue earned the pitching victories for the Husker frosh.

Track Squad Falls

Only a handful of Huskers managed first places in a triangular track meet in Madison Saturday in which Wisconsin garnered 102 points, Nebraska 64 and North Illinois 40.

The Cornhuskers' Dave Kudron strode to a pair of hurdle victories, while teammates Hugh McGovern (660), Steve Krebs (high jump) and Dennis Hagin (Discus) joined him with wins.

Greene Last
Nebraska sprint star Charlie Greene finished last of seven in the 100, being upset the first time in his college career.

Joel Cochran of Northern Illinois won the 100 in a 9.5 clocking with the wind. Cochran also won the 220.

Going into the Saturday round the Huskers had lost only one meet — to Wichita State in the season opener. Oklahoma State, last year's Big Eight champion, was one of the NU victims. The Cowboys were hit at

Lincoln last Saturday, 8-7, as a strong team showing also put the Huskers past Kansas.

"We had five lettermen this year, for a change," said coach Harry Good, "and experience has never hurt anyone." Good feels that the combination of a stronger team and some unusually warm early-spring weather helped to jell the Huskers earlier this season.
