

Masters Display Varied Interests-Buses, Psyche

(EDITOR'S NOTE: In preparation for Master's Week, the Daily Nebraskan will be printing a series of articles on Masters' week plans and the Masters themselves. Master's Week is May 1 through 4 this year.)

Among the Masters who will be visiting the University this year are Dr. Joseph McVicker Hunt, Professor of Psychology at the University of Illinois; and Henry Vance Greenslit, president of Greyhound Bus Lines.

Hunt, who was born in Scottsbluff in 1906, attended the University where he was a member of Phi Kappa Psi fraternity and an Inter-Collegiate Representative of the University Y.M.C.A.

He earned his B. A. Degree in 1929 and his Master's Degree in 1930 at Nebraska. In 1933 he received his Ph.D. at Cornell.

Illinois Professor Hunt was a professor at Brown, Columbia, and Pembroke Universities before taking a position at the University of Illinois where he has been Professor and Coordinator of Training in Clinical and Counseling Psychology since 1951.

He was president of the American Psychological Association from 1951 to 1952.

In 1944, he received the "Favorite Professor" award at Pembroke. He received the Five Year Research Career Award from the National Institute of Mental Health in 1962, and he has received awards of excellence in research from the American Personnel and Guidance Association.

Unrealized Potential He was the author of "Intelligence and Experience"

which organizes the evidence accumulated since World War II on unrealized potential for intellectual development in young children. He was editor of the Journal of Abnormal and Social Psychology from 1949 to 1955.

Greenslit was a member of Alpha Tau Omega fraternity while attending the University. He was the director of the orchestra for Kosmet Klub and had a lead in The Dream Pirate, Kosmet Klub's Spring Show in 1927. He obtained his Law Degree at Nebraska in 1928.

Claims Attorney He was Claims attorney for the Yellow Way Bus System and for the Colonial Stage System. In 1932 he joined a subsidiary of Greyhound Lines as a general attorney.

He was named President of Greyhound's Southern Division in 1954 and later became President of the merged Southeastern and Atlantic Lines.

He was elected President of Greyhound Lines and a member of the Board of Directors. He presently resides with his wife in Chicago.
