

Some Women Directors Back Junior, 21 Keys

The prevailing opinion among University housemothers and residence directors questioned by the Daily Nebraskan is that the extension of senior keys, to the junior women and to those women who are 21 who meet the eligibility requirements, would be a highly practical and workable program.

Kappa Kappa Gamma housemother, Mrs. Weigel, is highly in favor of extending the senior key system. In talking to housemothers from other states she has found that this expansion has worked out well at other Universities. Mrs. Weigel added that in Utah, the sophomores who had high enough grade averages were allowed the

privilege of having keys. Juniors 'Mature'

Miss Mary Francis Holman, Pound Hall Residence Director, would be very pleased if juniors were allowed to have keys. She stated that the juniors are mature enough to handle the responsibility. She added that at home, these women wouldn't be made to come in at a specified hour, so there is no reason why they shouldn't have keys.

Expansion of the senior key system would "mechanically work out fine," stated Mrs. Jan Hazlet, Sandoz residence director. "There is good reason to seriously consider the expansion of keys to juniors and 21 year olds, and I

would not be opposed to expanding the present system," she added.

Mrs. Agnes Hakel, Sigma Kappa housemother, "Doesn't think that there should be too much objection to expansion of senior keys." "If the girls don't abuse the privilege, there are times when they should enjoy this privilege," she added.

Negative Comments

Several of the housemothers polled had negative comments toward extending the key system to eligible juniors and 21 year old women.

Mrs. Mary Ward, housemother of Delta Delta Delta is not in favor of the system and "does not feel that it would be too practical." "I may be awfully conservative," she added, "but when we live in a situation such as this, seniors should have more privileges that do not extend to juniors."

"With all these late nights, the girls won't be on the dean's honor roll," stated Mrs. Anita Campbell, Alpha Delta Pi housemother. "What's good for one girl isn't necessarily good for another," added Mrs. James Arnold, Alpha Xi Delta housemother.

Key System Expansion

According to a motion passed by the AWS Board, the senior key system will be expanded in order that all junior and senior women and all women over 21 who meet the eligibility requirements may participate in the system.

"Each girl who is eligible to participate in the key system and who desires to do so will pay AWS a deposit of \$1.60 as soon as she receives permission to participate in the system."

"This money will be put into a permanent fund to provide for replacement of a cylinder (a lock) and keys in the event that a key is lost from a living unit," according to the motion presented by senior key chairman, Mimi Rose.

University women will be eligible to participate in the key system with parental permission and a 2.0 grade average, Miss Rose stated.

Underground Film Shown At Sheldon

Flashing lights intermingled with colors and shadows gradually reach a frenzied climax of disconnected motion and slowly settle into distinguishable patterns of light.

"Heroine," a 7½ minute experimental film used in creating this event, was produced by three university students; Bob Erickson, Mick Love and Tom Kay.

"Underground" Films

"Heroine" portrays the moods and emotions of the heroine user. It is representative of films being made around the nation in the "Underground" film movement.

"We took several hours worth of film to get the seven and one-half minutes of film we actually wanted to use," Lowe explained. "The splicing alone took another eight or nine hours."

Another underground movie, "Scram of the Slum God" depicts a "man crying out from the jungle of civilization."

This film, produced by Jim Bledig and Sandy Becker, will be shown in the Nebraska Union at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday and 9 p.m. Thursday. A 25c admission price will be charged at each performance.

An upsurge of interest in experimental or "underground" films at the University prompted the Nebraska Union Film Committee to offer a film techniques class under the Nebraska Free University program.

Chairman Susie Jenkins and co-chairman Jeff Heiden organized the class outline for the 15 students and professors enrolled in the class.

"We work on new film techniques and discuss experimental films produced by students," Miss Jenkins explained. "For a first effort, I think the program has been a real success."

Working on individual programs and films, most students use an eight mm movie camera. Because most hand cameras do not have sound apparatus, a sound track has to be taped separately and co-ordinated with the film.

"If we're going to continue the program next year,

however, we have to solve two problems; money to finance film-making equipment, and a class leader with experience."

Earlier in the semester, the union committee sponsored a film weekend in conjunction with Sheldon Art Gallery. A series of films and speakers explained filming techniques and movie criticism.

"We hope that our weekend program prompted Creighton University in Omaha to sponsor the film program they had a few weeks ago," Miss Jenkins said.

The Creighton program featured a lecture by film producer Otto Preminger.

"Underground" films created by other students include "Ultra Man," a superman satire produced by Lincoln Southeast senior Arthur Bullock. The film features double exposures to create a "flying" effect.

Other experimental films, produced throughout the country, appear every lery.
