

# Professor, More Students Are Nominated For Award

Seven students and one faculty member received letters of nomination for Outstanding Nebraskan since Thursday.

Former ASUN President Terry Schaaf, chairman of the first Faculty Evaluation Book Ladd Lonnquist, former AUF president Bob Milligan, former ASUN senator Curt Bromm, PSA chairman Mel Schlachter, IDA member Dave Shonka and graduate student James Parsons were nominated for the student award; and political science professor Ivan Volgyes received a nomination for the faculty recognition.

They join Dr. John Lonnquist, Dr. Peter Wolfe, Dr. Lisle Rose and professor Stephen Cole as well as Larry Johnson, Joan McClymont and Bob Samuelbater, and vice-president of ASUN, a varsity deacon who were nominated earlier in the week.

**Schaaf's Nomination**  
Two letters nominating Schaaf stressed his service to his fraternity and to ASUN "never sacrificing one for the other."

The letters pointed out that he has served as a Student Senator, president of the Union Program Council, member of the Publications Board, member of the faculty senate subcommittee on student affairs, delegate to the ASUN constitutional convention, president of his fraternity.

Under Schaaf's administration, one letter said, the student bill of rights was written, work began on a faculty-student-administration court, housing regulations were discussed and changes suggested and a program to inform the state and the Unicameral of University needs was implemented.

**Ladd Lonnquist**  
A letter nominating Ladd Lonnquist stressed his work on the Faculty Evaluation Book, in his fraternity and Red Cross.

"He took upon himself

not only the responsibility but the actual work of writing and assembling the Faculty Evaluation Booklet."

The letter also states that Ladd, a recipient of the ASUN Distinguished Service Award, has shown a "concern for and desire to do something about improving the University community."

He has served as vice-president of his fraternity, president of Red Cross and over-all Spring Day chairman.

**Milligan's Nomination**  
Milligan's nomination cited him for service "far above that which is normally expected of a college student."

It continues that he has served as treasurer of Corn Cobs, president of AUF and treasurer of Innocents.

"He has shown his leadership abilities also in his fraternity," the letter adds, where he has been president and vice-president and has initiated such activities as a scholarship incentive program and extensive community service work.

**Bromm Nomination**  
Three letters nominating Bromm listed positions he has held as vice-president of East Union, chancellor of Alpha Zeta, ASUN senator, member of Innocents and pledge trainer and rush chairman of his fraternity.

Bromm's work as ASUN Legislative Liaison chairman drew praise from all three letters. The job, one letter said, was "certainly no easy task to fulfill and is one which could easily be slighted because of the complex issues and broad duties."

He has done a "magnificent job of working with the state legislature, ably representing the student's opinion and interests; fielding many difficult and complex questions directed at him from state senators," the letter added.

**Schlachter's Nomination**  
Schlachter's nomination refers to him as "a person

who contributes much behind the scenes" as it cites his work as chairman of the ASUN advisory board committee, chairman of the PSA and a University debater as examples.

The letter also states that he was a member of the All - University Champion Quiz Bowl team last year and a member of this year's runner-up team, a Career Scholar and was secretary of Residence Association for Men (RAM).

Schlachter, the letter continues, has also served the University as recording secretary of the Abel Hall constitutional convention, as chairman of the co-educational housing committee, membership in Sigma Rho-Tau Kappa Alpha.

**Dave Shonka Nominee**  
The letter nominating Dave Shonka stressed his work in dorm government, and particularly in suggesting an IDA - IFC - Panhellenic council.

Shonka was the chairman of the coed visiting committee and designed a Regents report on social and recreational facilities, the letter said.

Shonka is also a member of Phi Eta Sigma scholastic honorary.

**Parsons Nomination**  
James Parsons, a graduate student in the department of microbiology was nominated for his work in science-related fields.

The letter said that Parsons is a NASA Fellow in the microbiology department, a member of Sigma Xi science honorary and the Nebraska Academy of Sciences.

"His leadership ability and popularity are best exemplified, however, by his work as president of the newly formed Graduate-Faculty Association, the letter said.

**Volgyes Nomination**  
The letter nominating Ivan Volgyes, political science instructor, stressed his "rapport with students and his treatment of them as colleagues."

In addition to regular class and research activities, the letter said, Volgyes met with a student group this year to study theories of communism.

"This class was a "highly informal but respectful one," the letter said, "and he brought to his classes a wealth of background."

The letter concluded, "Volgyes represents the living qualities of both formal and informal education."
