The emphasis would be on looking beyond the fault concepts and broadening the court's discretion to examine the cause of the breakdown of the family.

On the other hand, Turner, in his article, "Retreat From 'Fault?' An English Lawyer's Views," points up the current reaction against traditional fault theory in divorce laws.

Future issues of the review will include articles on the problem of balancing public and private interests through divorce law.
