# No Longer Heroic

Senior Staff Writer If University students had "cause" last semester, it had to be the Heroic Book-

In fact, University students turned out two hundred strong one Saturday morning in April to march for the Heroic's right to sell pornography or anything

They marched completely equipped with pickets, flags, signs, a make-shift cross and a lame Saint Bernard named Moose

HARRASSMENT

The march occurred after proprietor Bill Steen had been indicted on six counts "possession with intent to sell pornographic literature." after three of his student employees spent a night in the Lincoln jail. and after Steen had been irritated with what he termed "constant police harrassment."

But Steen moved the store this summer, Steen died this summer. And the Heroic's not Heroic any more.

changed. The FM radio still blares the "1812 Overture" and "Lara's Theme" amidst thousands of books displayed on packing crates and makeshift shelves.

Customers can still buy books like "Guide to North American Waterfowl," (Volume Two) and magazines like "The Sun Era" ("The Nudist Age,"), and the twain, esoterica and erotica, meet on shelves and crates three feet from one

But there the resemblance ends. The Heroic is no longer a marketplace for "pornography," nor Lin-coln's best supplier of paper back books

After Steen's death last summer, ownership of the store fell to his mother. But his sister, Mrs. Mary Raff, Omaha operates the

So the management seems to be done in fact by two University coeds, Linnea Sallach and Lorna

Miss Sallach admitted

Wednesday afternoon, that things were pretty "messed up" at the Heroic. Steen moved the store from its location above Vanice Pontiac to a smaller, but streetlevel location between 10th and 11th on P Streets

PAPERBACKS INCREASE Most of the Heroic business is still done in nudist magazines and the like, according to Miss Sallach, but the number of paperbacks of interest to University students has declined, she ad-

The financial status of the store with regards to publishers is a bit uncertain at present, according to Miss Sallach. But one of Steen's favorite policies - that of ordering all the paperback books in print by a given publisher — has gone by the board, according to Miss

Sallach. The Heroic will still order any paperback in print one copy at a time, with a ten percent discount, according to Miss Sallach.

The string around the adult section with the sign "No one under 18 inside this area" has disappeared. Deputy County Attorney William Blue no longer makes periodic visits to the store, and there have been no arrests for months.
