—House Given To Foundation— Former Owner Provides Money For Restoration

The lights are on in the house hiding among the trees at 700 North 16. The house owned for nearly 60 years by the Syford family, became the property of the State Historical Society Foundation upon the death of Constance Syford in May, 1965. She had willed the house to the Society along with \$15,000 for its upkeep and \$15,000 for its restoration to the Historical Society with the stipulation that it be restored.

Presently the house is merely being preserved so it is occupied, therefore, by a caretaker. Only minor restorations will be necessary, however, as the house is almost in original condition, according to Marvin Kivett, State Historical Society director. "Our goal is to preserve this house for the future. It is the oldest remaining landmark on the University campus," Kivett said. He added that researchers believe the house was built between 1882 and 1885.

Since then its occupants have included University students and professors. Its last occupant, Miss Syford, was an instructor in the English department.

Flanked by the modern Methodist church and a sorority, the house stands like the Rock of Ages, weathering the storm of change. It has withstood dozens of University and city pleas to convert it into classrooms or a handful of parking stalls. Recent years have been accompanied with the fall of the rest of the University's original buildings. U Hall, the first building at the University, disappeared in the 1940's. Others which have met a similar fate include Grant Memorial and the old administration Building. In spite of this flurry of change, the old Syford home still stands, destined to link the past with the present.

Council Defeats Motion Panhell Nixes \$2 Assessment

The Panhellenic president's council last week defeated a motion to assess each sorority member \$2 to finance Greek Week entertainment next spring.

In part, Greek Week expenses have been assumed by Panhellenic. However, the Greek Week proposed for next spring is on a larger scale than previous ones, according to Shari Mueller, Panhellenic president.

The possibility of a smaller assessment and other alternatives will be discussed next week.

Panhellenic's deferred rush report requested by the Board of Regents is near completion, according to Kathy Kuester, report chairman.

The report included three topics specifically requested by the Board of Regents. They are: (1) an explanation of the present system, (2) the proposed changes for next year and (3) a report of the 83 girls who did not receive final bids in this year's Rush Week.

A straw vote of the sororities revealed that of the two proposed changes, 15 favor rush deferred one semester while two favor the one year deferral plan.

In other business, Panhellenic passed a motion stating that Panhellenic not participate in Sigma Chi's Derby Day spirit trophy competition. The deletion of the spirit trophy competition had been favored by the pledge trainers council.

Nebraskans Will Attend Anti-LBJ Conference

Two University students and two faculty members will attend the Conference for Concerned Democrats this weekend in Chicago.

The national convention is for Democrats who believe President Lyndon Johnson's "actions in Vietnam and their consequences at home and abroad are leading the nation to disaster," according to a statement on the conference's purpose.

Gene Pokorny and Ed Hilz are the students. Mike Oldfather, graduate assistant in Economics, and Dan Schlitt, assistant professor in the Department of Physics, are the faculty members who will attend the two-day conference.

Sen. Eugene McCarthy, Dem.-Mich., is scheduled to speak to the gathering Saturday evening. He is expected to announce his campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination at the meeting or Thursday in a press conference.

"The Nebraska delegation is going to the conference," Pokorny said, "to convince them that we want a full-scale campaign in this state, if someone announces they will run against Johnson."

Pokorny is also treasurer for the Nebraska Concerned Democrats, a group organized last month to encourage delegates to the Democratic National Convention who are either not pledged to Johnson or are pledged to another acceptable candidate.

"We want to show that there is a viable group of con-

cerned Democrats in Nebraska," he said.

The Nebraska group is planning an open letter to President Johnson that should also demonstrate this concern, he said.

The letter will appear as a three-quarters page advertisement in the Omaha World Herald, Dec. 3, according to Pokorny.

"We have between 500 and 600 signatures of people who have agreed to the contents of this open letter," he said. The signatures will appear in the advertisement, he added.

The Concerned Democrats

have encountered considerable interest in the movement to propose a Democratic candidate opposed to Johnson, he indicated.

"For every signature we have," Pokorny said, "there have been at least five people who agree to help, but who can not sign the letter for one reason or another."

Pokorny said that he felt the state group, which has been in operation for only a short time and has been work-only informally, has accomplished quite a bit in securing the signatures.

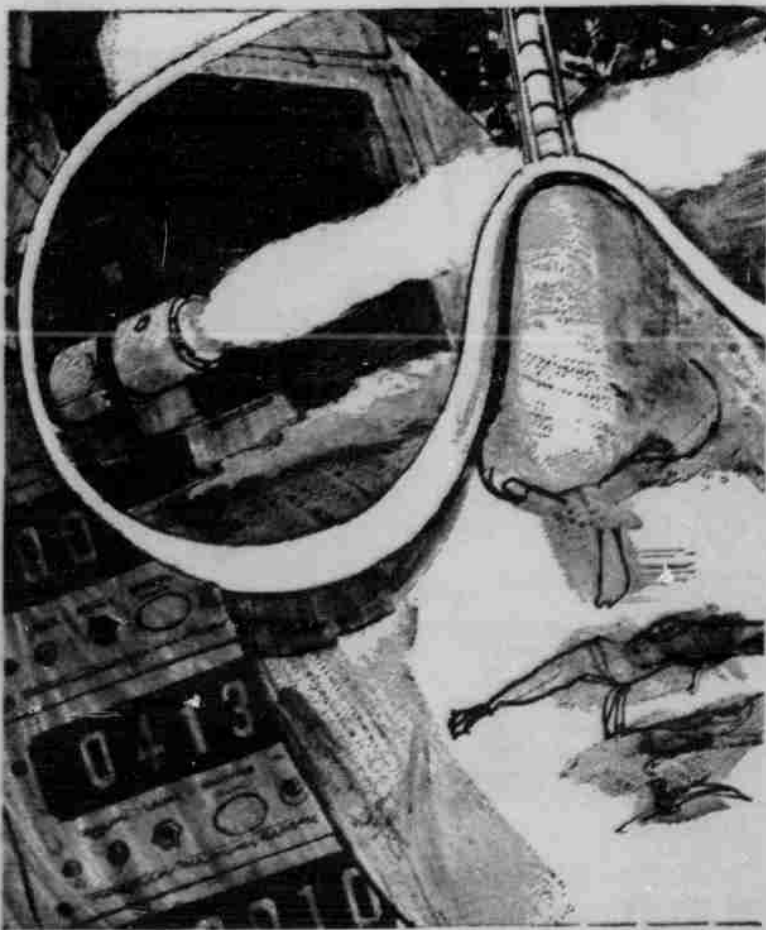
