Caldwell Play held over

Erksine Caldwell's "Tobacco Road," which opened in New York in 1933 and succeeded in establishing one of the longest runs in the history of the theater, will be presented Friday and Saturday by the Lincoln Community Playhouse at 8:30 p.m.

The Playhouse production features five University-affiliated performers. Jeeter Lester, major role in the play, is portrayed by Christopher Stashess, who is employed by KUON-TV.

Julie Pittenger, University student majoring in art will play Pearl Lester, Jeeter's beautiful daughter forced into an unhappy marriage. Her husband will be portrayed by Rod McCullough, also a student, who previously appeared in the University's laboratory production of "Saved."

Sister Bessie, an aging lady preacher who bribes Jeeter's son into marriage, will be Jan Healey, part time law student. John Winkworth, graduate assistant with the Counseling Service, has the part of Captain Tim.

Playhouse director Roland Reed announced that the two performances were not originally scheduled but were added by popular demand. Reed noted that the hold-over of "Tobacco Road" marks the eighth extended production requested from the past nine Playhouse presentations.

"Tobacco Road" is probably the most discussed play in the history of the American theater, according to a Playhouse representative. Individual reactions vary from the satisfied feeling of superiority over the characters to an indignant impression of scandal.

Caldwell, commenting on the play in a press release, described it as the story of the effects of contemporary morals and economic environment upon humanity.

"All human beings wherever they live, are subject to contemporary moral and economic environment. 'Tobacco Road,' by reason of birth and circumstance, was the home of a few. It might have been, or may be, in the future, that of many other people," he said.

The traditional Coed Follies consisting of six skits and four travelers acts will be presented Friday at 8 p.m. at Pershing Auditorium. Winners of Ideal Nebraska Coed and Outstanding Collegiate Man will be announced.

He added that he is working through Ankrum to get a speaker from the National Community Union to appear on campus some time in March. The National Community Union is a group planning large-scale organization of poor and working class whites in urban areas.

'Expo in Retro' theme of AWS coed follies

Foreign viewpoints juxtaposed to the University in a series of skits entitled "Expo in Retro" will be presented at the traditional Coed Follies 8 p.m. Friday at Pershing Auditorium.

Tickets for the production sponsored by AWS are available at the Nebraska Union and can be purchased from any AWS worker or representative.

Kathy Kuester, Chairman of Coed Follies and mistress of ceremonies, explained that the theme of the program is based on the world's fair, with each skit representing a different country.

Local problems transposed

Subject matter deals with University issues as they would appear to citizens of a particular country in connection with their own controversies. Miss Kuester added that transposing local problems to the international level provides an interesting insight and good entertainment.

The skits include "Days of Rice and Riots," set in Communist China and presented by Alpha Delta Pi sorority under the direction of Mary Lynne Nelson.

Miss Kuester described the episode as satire concerning student demonstrations. In this instance, students at Peeking University (P.U.) riot

for better food, only to be instructed that they are living and eating in the best of all possible worlds.

Satire struggle

Pound Hall will present "A City of Two Tales," directed by skitmaster Pam Carter. The satire deals with the struggle between the monarchy and the rebels during the French Revolution.

Monaco is the setting for "Political Playground," presented by Pi Beta Phi sorority and directed by Judy Windle. The skit compares international relations to games of chance, where no one wins and no one loses, but money changes hands.

Kappa Alpha Theta sorority will sponsor a skit set in Arabia entitled "Kamel-lot or 1001 Arabian Fights." A camel race symbolizing the relationship between students and administration is featured.

Problems arise

"Lost in Der Wilderness," satirizing the controversy concerning the open house policy, will be presented by Delta Delta Delta sorority and directed by Susan Evers. The skit is set in Germany where a multitude of problems arise when the Hansels and Gretels decide that they really should

be allowed to see each other more frequently.

Nancy Biere will direct the skit sponsored by Gamma Phi Beta sorority entitled "Bucking Tradition or More SPY-cifically: It's Chime for a Change." Subject of the skit is traditional British reserve challenged by Carnaby Street swingers.

The revolution begins when the bell that chimes for the changing of the guards is stolen. Scotland Yard is called to meet the crisis and the two opposing forces of old and new clash.

Travelers acts featured

Four travelers acts will also be featured in the Follies. Roni Meyer and Becky McSpadden will perform vocal solos and the Delta Delta Delta Washboard Band will play hillbilly and ragtime music. A satire of singers Carol Burnett and Julie Andrews appearing at Carnegie Hall will be presented by Linda Riggs and Peggy Rees.

Miss Kuester noted that the highlight of the Follies will be the presentations of trophies to first and second place skits and the announcement of the winners of Ideal Nebraska Coed and Outstanding Collegiate Man.
