Marxer's remarks provoke charges

Charles Marxer, University philosophy instructor, said Wednesday that the charges made against him by State Senator Henry Pederson of Omaha "merit no comment."

Pederson had asked Lancaster County Attorney Paul Douglas to file a complaint

against Marxer for the anti-draft and anti-war statements he made last week at Hyde Park, according to the Lincoln Journal. Douglas said no complaint will be filed because the remarks had no criminal connection.

Marxer said that his NDRU is well on its way with four counselors and a staff that has doubled since the first plans were made for the organization.

He added that he "really has no idea" how many people his staff has counseled, but that 30 counselees "wouldn't be exaggerated number." He said he has counseled at least twelve himself since February.

There have been no official complaints from the University administration so far, nor has there been any outright attack from the Selective Service about NDRU, Marxer said.

He added that the organization now has an office and that money contributions toward support of the organization are "doing fine."

Stu all-opponent

Columbia, Mo.—Jo Jo White of Kansas and Don Smith of Iowa State were unanimous choices on Missouri's 1967-68 all-opponent basketball team.

The Tigers also selected: Steve Honeycutt, Kansas State; Stu Lantz, Nebraska; and Don Adams, Northwestern, who edged out Barry Orms of St. Louis U. for the fifth spot.

Senate requests probe into discrimination

"In December, 1967 the Regents requested that we (IFC and Panhellenic) inquire into the discrimination question," Miss Kuester said. "We are fully aware of the problems and we are working at this time with the Administration and the Regents."

"The Senate can urge action at this time, and we would be happy to accept the request," she said.

Senator Tom Morgan agreed with Miss Kuester, saying that he could see little need to urge things to be done when they are already being done.

In further action, Senator

Phelps introduced a substitute resolution to a bill introduced last week by Senator Bob Weaver, which would have urged establishment of Cardinal Key and Blue Key Senior Honoraries at the University.

Miss Phelps' measure, urging Mortar Boards and Innocents' Society Honoraries to raise the ceiling on membership quotas, passed by unanimous voice vote.

Senior honoraries

Miss Phelps noted that the present senior honorary system does not perpetuate a "very honest" attitude toward activities.

"If we make the group less of a leadership reward system, and draw attention to the problem, a new attitude toward student activities may develop," she said.

Senator Phil Boardman said

he questioned the power of Senate to even request the change and further stated that he felt the groups do not furnish any kind of "leadership rewards."

Pass salary bill

Senate also passed the executive salary bill, which set permanent salaries for the ASUN President, First Vice President and Second Vice President. Salaries for the executives are: President, \$500, First Vice President and Second Vice President \$400 apiece.

The bill was passed with an amendment by Senator Weaver which stated that candidates for executive offices should state any contracts for employment or conflicting agreements with the University which might suggest a possible conflict of interests.

Preregistration set April 1-2

Preregistration for the summer and fall semesters will take place April 1-2 for all currently enrolled students.

Schedules of classes will be available in all University housing units, the Nebraska Union, Agriculture Hall 207 on East Campus and the Administration Building starting Friday, March 29.

Bowker said students should see their advisers starting April 1. Those students regis-

tering for both summer and fall classes are required to fill out separate worksheets. A \$50 deposit fee is required for fall preregistration. There is no fee for summer preregistration.

Fire drop and add will be held from May 16-31. Although drop and add will be extended to July 19, Bowker indicated that after May 31 students will be eligible only if they have failed a course, have not met prerequisite requirements, or if they depend on a change in program for registration.

Registration forms will be mailed in August to those students who have preregistered according to Bowker.

"I encourage all students to register between April 1-2, because it will give us a better opportunity to provide them with their required classes," Bowker stated.
