OU's Martin excels in tennis too

Basketball and tennis may seem like a rare combination, but Oklahoma's Scott Martin mixes the two sports successfully.

Only a sophomore, Martin is a starting Sooner guard and last year claimed the Big Eight Conference singles and doubles tennis titles as a freshman.

The Bartlesville, Okla., native earned all-America recognition in basketball and all-State acclaim in football in high school.

WHAT'S MORE, Martin hasn't suffered academically with a heavy athletic program. He compiled a 3.7 grade point average as a freshman.

Martin's emergence as a floor leader and shooter is one of the reasons why the Sooners are constructing their best record in years. He hit 10 points in Saturday's OU win at Iowa State and is averaging in double figures for the season.

Martin, however, hasn't been completely satisifed with Oklahoma's team play. "We still haven't put it together for a whole game," he says, although the Sooners won the Big Eight Conference basketball tournament for the first time in December.

Martin admits he feels considerable pressure when Oklahoma plays road games.

"I get emotional, but I try to keep it under control," he says. "To win on the road a team has to shoot the good shots and keep the ball moving." MARTIN BELIEVES that a basketball

MARTIN BELIEVES that a basketball team must force its opponent to make more mistakes, if it is to win. "This is tougher to do on the road," he notes.

Quickness plays a big role in forcing mistakes, and Martin feels that tennis complements his basketball quickness.

"Is tennis you stop and start quick like in basketball," he explained, "and you have to react quickly in both sports."

Martin's selection of OU was not a surprise. His father (Bill) captained the 1938 Sooner basketball team. He's now a Phillips Petroleum Co. executive.


