

Defensive backs unseasoned

Nebraska football coach Bob Devaney can hardly be blamed for looking ahead six months.

That's when the Cornhuskers must find a solution for fleet Southern California flanker and this year's Rose Bowl hero Bob Chandler.

CHANDLER, WHO burned all-Big 8 defensive halfback Dana Stephenson for an easy touchdown in last year's 31-21 Trojan win over the Huskers, is a future singular problem, but Devaney is making immediate adjustments for other pass receiving threats.

For instance, he's shifted placekicker and offensive halfback Paul Rogers and split end Dave Mason to defensive halfbacks.

The pair hopefully will be part of the answer to such losses as Stephenson, Randy Reeves and Al Larson in the secondary.

Jim Anderson is the only returning regular in the

defensive backfield. Mason, a sophomore, will be tried at Larson's vacant Monster slot, Devaney indicated.

BACKFIELD PROBLEMS, however, are not the only defensive headaches, which includes having only two returning starters — Anderson and linebacker Jerry Murtaugh — open spring drills April 5.

Full-time defensive tackle starter Dave Walline and part-time tackle regular Larry Jacobson are sidelined from spring drills after knee surgery.

That leaves little experience and a wide open race for starting defensive assignments.

LETTERMEN JOHN Decker, Bill Kosch, Dave Morock and Tom McClelland are expected to help ease the defensive backfield trouble along with non-letterman Gary Hollstein.

The defensive line, which graduated ends Sherwin Jarmon and Mike Wynn, tackle Bob Liggett, and middle guard Ken Geddes will see many new faces since end John Adkins and middle guard Ed Periard are the only seasoned performers.

Golfers to open season

Nebraska golf coach Harry Good will have his first opportunity to evaluate his squad Monday as the Husker golfers open their season with a triangular meet against Creighton and South Dakota at 1 p.m. at Holmes Park.

GOOD EXPLAINED that the squad hasn't been outside enough to be able to determine what kind of season it will have. The golfers have been confined to the football practice field for most of the early workouts.

The Huskers' returning lettermen are Frank Rose, a senior from Fairbury, Chuck Walter, a senior from Geneva, and Larry Mason, a senior from Falls Church, Va.

ROSE IS the defending Nebraska means amateur champion.

Walter and Craig Waugh, a junior from Atlantic, Iowa, have been playing the best golf in practice according to Good.

Other squad members who will be used in Monday's meet are Jim Roudebush a senior from Gering; Mike Miller, a sophomore from Bellevue; Lance Gloe, a junior from Lincoln; Dave Gildea, a junior from Columbus; Bob Hillis, a junior from Grand Island; and Doug Brown, a senior from Lincoln.

In most meets five golfers are used by a team, but eight will be used in Monday's meet, Good said.

THE HUSKERS have a 14-meet schedule, climaxed by the Big Eight meet in Lawrence, Kan., May 15-16. NU finished last in the 1969 conference tournament.
