## New University:

# End impersonal learning

The New University, one of four parties in the April 22 ASUN elections, is recommending a student on the Board of Regents, an end to mass classes and impersonality in all areas of learning and the right of students to entertain guests of their choice in on-campus housing.

Randy Prier, a current member of both the ASUN Senate and the Council on Student Life (CSL), is the New University's presidential candidate. Also on Prier's ticket are Barry Pilger, for first vice president and Bill Smitherman, for second vice president.

The first goal of a student government must be to seek a free atmosphere in which students may encounter new experiences, according to the

New University's platform.

In order to establish more equitable student participation in University affairs, the party is recommending an all-university senate be established and that ASUN form the issues for University decision-making bodies, such as CSL.

The New University is also proposing that a student controlled interest group run the Nebraska Union as well as programming and services to students. Other services proposed by the party include a student gas station, a child day-care center, a complete legal aid program and snack service to living units.

Other proposals of the New University include:

—Expansion of the concept of Centennial College com-

munity living and individual learning.

—ASUN budget funds independent of Administration control, obtained from the operation of ASUN-run services.

—Freedom for all students to choose where they live.

—Revamping the student disciplinary system.

## Coalition wants reform

"The ASUN Senate can do longer pretend to be a legislative body," according to the University Coalition's platform.

If elected in the April 22 ASUN elections, University Coalition candidates promise to have ASUN promoting educational reform, providing services to students and protecting students' legal rights.

The University Coalition is headed by presidential candidate Steve Tiwald and second vice-presidential candidate Mark Theisen. The party is supporting Dave Bingham, a former ASUN senator, as a write-in candidate for first vice president.

The University Coalition's main goal is to foster and encourage a unified effort of students, faculty and administrators in building a University community which will respond to the total educational needs of the stu-

dent, according to the party's platform.

The platform also states that the University Coalition will research the possible creation of student co-operatives such as a bread and milk store, a book store, a gas station, and a day-care center.

An additional service suggested by the Coalition is the creation of an ombudsman to aid individual students if they encounter administrative difficulties.

The University Coalition proposes that the goal of the University should be to free students by teaching them to do their own learning. To accomplish this goal, the Coalition recommends the development of more residential colleges, the re-evaluation of group and major requirements, the extension of interdisciplinary studies, the ex-

pansion of independent study and the granting of academic credit to students doing field work in the community.

Other campaign goals of the University Coalition include:

—Extending faculty evaluation to cover all faculty members.

—Free inter-campus bus service.

—The revision of the campus judicial system.

—The promotion and research of a University senate.
