Service party defines goals

Providing more services to University students, establishing an all University senate and encouraging educational reform are some of the ASUN campaign goals of the Service Party.

Ken Wald, Service Party ASUN presidential candidate, heads a ticket of Bob Pfeiffer, for first vice president and Sue Lutton for second vice president.

The Service Party platform states that current ASUN programs — faculty evaluation, the record store and Unicameral lobbying — ought to be continued and expanded. The platform suggests that such services as a day care center, a gasoline station, a drugstore, an employment agency and a bookstore should be investigated and, if feasible, initiated.

"There are many reasons for emphasizing the service approach," according to the Service Party platform. "It is something that students deserve in return for the money they give to student government."

The Service Party believes that a University senate would insure that the various University groups would work in concert.

"The absurd proliferation of authority on this campus has gone so far that the need for a central authority has become obvious," according to the Party's platform.

The Service Party believes that a University Senate would provide a central locus of authority and help alleviate the confusion which results from the bureaucratic maze of University committees and legislative bodies.

The Service Party believes that ASUN should devote a considerable portion of its energy to educational reform and innovation.

"The departures from tradition of the last four years should be renewed, states the Party's platform. "Summer reading courses, the Centennial Education Program and Free University courses should become more the rule rather than the exception."

Another goal of the Service Party is to increase student representation on the various decision-making committees in the University.

Coalition 1st VP leaves race

Ron Alexander, one of the organizers of this year's World in Revolution conference, has withdrawn as an ASUN first vice presidential candidate according to Electoral Commissioner Glenn Nees.

Alexander, before withdrawing, was the University Coalition's candidate for first vice president. Steve Tiwald, the University Coalition's presidential candidate, said Wednesday that Alexander withdrew because of "personal reasons."

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
