Take a walk to combat auto pollution

A group of University of Nebraska students is planning a unique way to combat a ma-jor cause of pollution - the automobile.

"We hope to select a certain day during which people will

voluntarily forego the use of any private transportation vehicle run by an internal combustion engine," said Charles R. Haskins, chairman of the Leave-Your-Car-At-Home-Day Committee.

The group has just recently formed, so no date has been chosen yet. The date will be later this year, possibly September 22.

But Haskins emphasized that Leave-Your-Car-at-Home

Day will only be the climax of a continuing effort to stop the destruction caused by the automobile.

"It is obvious that the government alone won't stop the damage to our society caused indirectly or directly by the transportation industry,"

Haskins, a sophomore from Millard, Neb., said that the transportation industry is damaging the environment in two ways.

"Cars pollute the environment by their exhaust," he said. "In addition, the automobile is terribly unsafe and Detroit manufacturers refuse to do much about it."

If any meaningful improvement in the environment is to be expected, an all out effort by concerned individuals and groups must be forthcoming, he said.

As one alternative, Haskins suggested a national planning board consisting of prominent individuals in the fields of auto safety, ecology, rapid transit systems and automobile improvement. The planning board could recommend standards to be followed by the transportation industry.

Also, pressure must be placed on government agencies and Congress to approve relevant legislation, he said.

Haskins said that, if Detroit automakers will not voluntarily

place anti-pellution devices on automobiles, legislation should force the car makers to do so.

Automobiles are in great need of safety devices, Haskins continued. Some of the devices have already been perfected; others need more research. But, he added, government ought to force the auto manufacturers to install them.

"We'll just have to concentrate our effort toward breaking the power of Detroit," Haskins said. "The best method of humbling the Big Four automatkers is to jeopardize their profits."

"It seems that the auto manufacturers do not respond to anything but financial pressure," Haskins said. "It's up to the citizens of the United States to show Detroit how much we want changes to be

He does not deny that the Leave-Your-Car-at-Home-Day Committee will have to work hard to accomplish anything.

Hopefully, the day when all citizens will leave their car at home will help draw attention to the problems automobiles are causing, Haskins said.

"Many people are finally beginning to realize the desperate situation this country is in," he concluded. "We've got to improve the environmental situation, and cars are a major cause of the pro-
