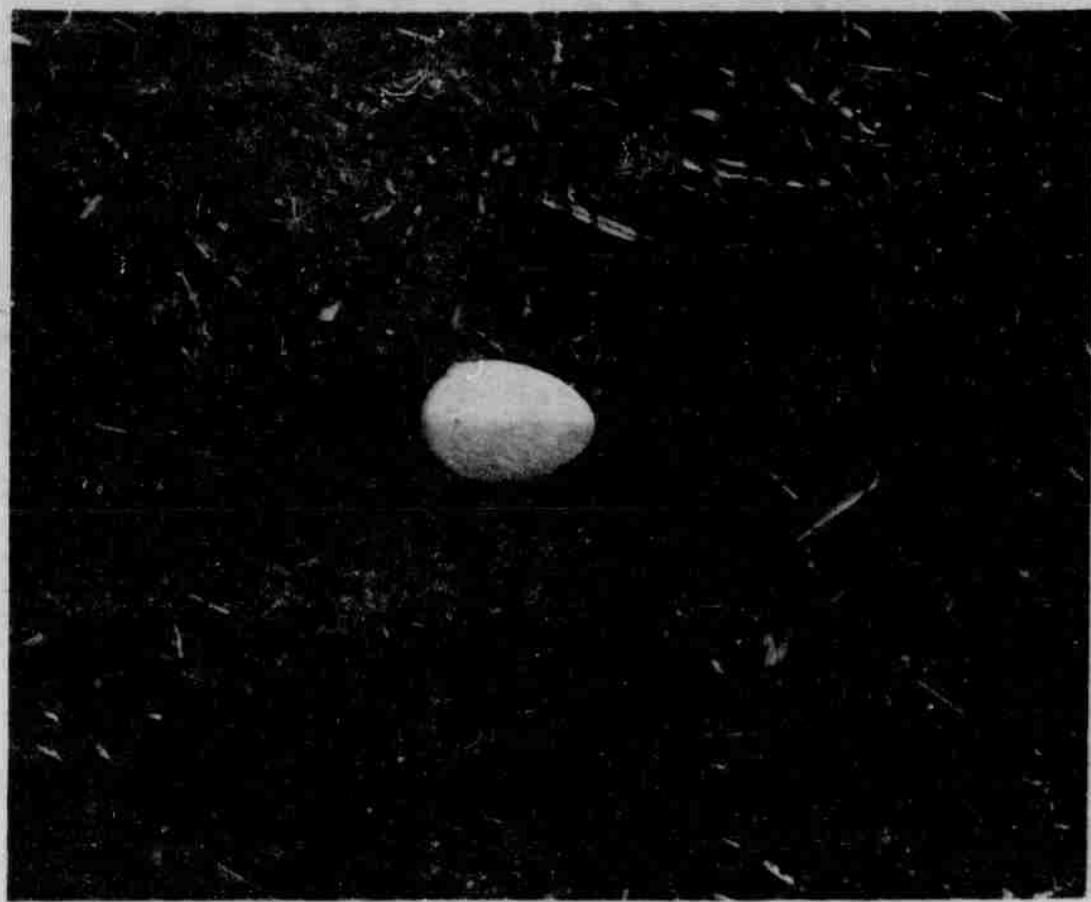

Citizen deals low blow to Blotchfelder support

Omaha — Leroy Liquidator, using Nebraska's controversial self-defense act as a defense, pleaded innocent today of wounding gubernatorial candidate Cliffnut Blotchfelder.
