

Proposal could cause hardship

plained that there is no way to force an instructor to accept an absence. He added that few instructors failed to accept an excuse signed by a dean under the absence rule.

Chatfield also noted that every college now has a grading committee. If an instructor refused to accept the excuse, an appeal could be made to one of these committees.

Wallace M. Rudolph, professor of law, pointed out that the excused absence policy should be emphasized in senate action because one professor could "chill a good many students".

He added, "It is doubtful that some professor will say a student can't go to a funeral, but it isn't very doubtful that some professor might say a student can't carry on campaign activities during class time."

Also speaking at the open meeting, Dwayne Arff, agricultural engineering student, noted that Option One would shorten the summer work period for students.

Arff said that this might cause some students financial hardships or even make some jobs unavailable.

Richard S. Harnsberger, professor of law, said that the University as an institution should retain a politically neutral position. He added, however, that the problem is to involve students, many of whom are under 21 and cannot vote, in the political process.
