

Library director says Love funds inadequate

"Nebraskans should start realizing that a university is more than a football stadium," says Frank A. Lundy, director of the University of Nebraska libraries system.

This summer the Nebraska Supreme Court invalidated a legislative bill that would have provided four million dollars towards expansion of Love Memorial Library. The expansion money was appropriated by the necessary two-thirds of the legislature after the second reading of the bill, but the bill did not receive enough support after the third and final reading.

Lundy is director of a library system including Love Library on the city campus and Thompson Library on east campus. He also directs the smaller, specialized libraries such as Law, Physics and Mathematics which are located in their respective colleges.

All of the libraries under Lundy's direction are operated under one budget which he draws up and recommends to Lincoln campuses president Joseph Soshnik. From there the budget recommendation passes through the chancellor's office, the governor's office, and the legislature's budget committee before it is voted on in the Unicameral.

Lundy says he never gets back all he asks for. "Right now we are one of the weakest schools in the Big Eight in terms of library support," he states.

"In the Association of American Universities we are 46th out of 47 in terms of liorary support.

The library director channels some of the blame for his problems to the legislature. "They play politics," he says. "They don't care about what we really need."

Included in the problem is the fact that "we're too big a University. We offer too many programs for the size of the pocketbook."
