"There is little that can be done in the way of service in three days, said Dressel, "but we hope to gain a better understanding of Indian life, and Indian-White relations,"

The chapel sponsored a similar program last year and the participants felt their attitudes were significantly changed and their understanding increased, he

members of St. John Lutheran Church in Parmalee, South Dakota, adjacent to the Rosebud Indian Reservation. (Rosebud is 50 miles north of Valentine.) Participants will pay only for their traveling expneses-about \$15.

Dressel hopes the group will be able to see the attitudes of both the Indians and their white neighbors. Ideally this original encounter will spur students to participate in tutoring programs for the Indians, activities of the Indian Center or other longterm involvements, he remarked.

Committee kills housing bills

Three low-income housing bills failed to get the approval of the Legislature's Public Health and Welfare Committee and have been indefinitely postponed.

LB 898, which would have put at least one low-income housing tenant on the local housing authority commission, LB 901, which provided for tenants to bring their homes up to minimum housing standards by deducting the cost from rent, and LB 902, which waived tenant representation on housing authority boards from conflict of interest laws, all were killed by identical 7-0

Also advanced Tuesday was a bill creating a state system of community colleges. The bill, LB 759, passed the Legislature's Education Committee by an 8-0 vote.

Committee chairman Sen. Don Elrod of Grand Island said the system should relieve enrollment and budget pressures on the University of Nebraska and the state
