any kind of government would be "undemocratic".

To Cannon the treaty "appears to be an attempt not to aid peace but to circumvent government."

But members of the Peace Treaty Committee said endorsement of the treaty would democratically show the government what the people want.

"RIGHT NOW it's more radical to agree with Nixon than with this treaty," Shuster said. "The Gallup pole showed 73 per cent of Americans want out of Vietnam by the end of 1971."

The People's Peace Treaty was drawn up as a result of a trip made to Vietnam by a delegation of National Student Association (NSA)

representatives last December.

Two of the three veterans on NU's Peace Treaty Committee served in Vietnam. Both Shuster and fellow Vietnam veteran Jack McCormack agreed that the South Vietnamese want nothing to do with American forces in their country.

THE PEACE Treaty Committee members said endorsing the treaty was a good way to symbolically show solidarity with the people of South Vietnam.

But Terry Cannon said there was nothing symbolic in the intent of the treaty.

Acceptance of the treaty would serve as a blank check for anybody like Rene Davis, who says he'll close down Washington this spring, he said. Davis came to national attention as one of the defendants in the Chicago 7 conspiracy trial.

Davis said at NSA's February Ann Arbor conference "on May 1 people should mass in Washington, D.C. and present the government with the peace treaty, demanding that Nixon respond within two days by calling for an immediate end to the war."

"Beginning on May 3 and continuing for the rest of the week," Davis continued, "the

people who presented the treaty and the thousands who would join them should close down the functions of the federal government through massive civil disobedience."

Cannon called this strategy an "integral part of the treaty."

NSA HAS ALSO stated in a directive concerning the treaty that "when organizing around the Treaty, it is important to stress that ratifying the Peace Treaty means pledging to take whatever actions are appropriate to implement the terms of this Joint Treaty and to insure its acceptance by the government of the United States."

The statement quoted in the NSA directive is included in the treaty as NSA circulated it. But that statement was deleted from the treaty NU students will vote on.

NU supporters of the treaty explained at the March 17 ASUN meeting that the statement had been deleted because the vote was not to ratify the treaty, but merely to determine sentiment.

The treaty was voted down 1,432 to 857 in the University of Nebraska at Omaha spring elections. UNO was the first American campus to defeat the treaty. More than 20 universities have ratified the treaty nationally.

Issue was taken by several students who argued that few other major universities have that kind of load.

Sullivan countered that the state administrators do plan to maintain the University in the classical sense.

The discussion then took a turn toward the subject of how to keep and attract a high quality of instructors and students to Nebraska.

Other than higher salaries, it was agreed that faculty members can be attracted by offering regular sabbatical leaves and by maintaining an adequate research library. Another attraction is the physical enticements offered by states like Colorado.

Sullivan commended the "penetrating questions" he faced and indicated he would try and arrange for Lieske, who holds a doctorate in education from NU, to hold a similar session with the group.

The following issue will be on the April 7 Spring ballot:

I FAVOR:

- PACE Committee Plan (refundable after tuition payment)
- Regents' Committee Plan (deductible from tuition payment)

The PACE Committee plan and the Regents' Committee plan are two different ways of implementing the PACE proposal. The Pace Program of Term Exemption in Education proposed calls for a special addition to student fees, amounting to \$3.00 per student per semester and \$1.25 per student per summer session. This amount that would be used to provide a scholarship fund for the summer session which will be administered by the Office of Scholarship and Financial Aid. The Board of Regents on March 11 agreed to implement the Pace program for the next period of the year which means a majority vote in a referendum to be held in the Spring General Election.

PACE COMMITTEE PLAN
A vote in favor of the PACE Committee plan means you are voting for a plan to reduce the PACE fee to \$3.00 per semester and \$1.25 per summer session. This amount would be used to provide a scholarship fund for the summer session which will be administered by the Office of Scholarship and Financial Aid. The Board of Regents on March 11 agreed to implement the Pace program for the next period of the year which means a majority vote in a referendum to be held in the Spring General Election.

REGENTS' COMMITTEE PLAN
A vote in favor of the Regents' Committee plan means you are voting for a plan to reduce the PACE fee to \$3.00 per semester and \$1.25 per summer session. This amount would be used to provide a scholarship fund for the summer session which will be administered by the Office of Scholarship and Financial Aid. The Board of Regents on March 11 agreed to implement the Pace program for the next period of the year which means a majority vote in a referendum to be held in the Spring General Election.

Agriculture and Home Economics students vote at East Union from 8:00 am-5:00 pm and then at City Union Lounge from 5:00 pm-8:00 pm.
All other students vote at City Union Lounge from 8:00 am-8:00 pm.

A United States Marine Corps Officer Selection Team will visit the University of Nebraska campus on March 30 & 31 and April 1 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Captain B. V. Taylor, Officer Selection Officer from Omaha, will be interviewing in Room 225 Nebraska Union Placement Office. The Marine Corps has officer programs available for freshman through seniors. All lead to a second lieutenant's commission upon graduation. While attending college, the student attends no meetings or drills, is draft deferred, and receives longevity which results in much higher pay (as much as \$150 extra per month.)
