

# Colorado may open 'bag of tricks'

Colorado coach Eddie Crowder is known for going to his bag of tricks when the Buffalos play Nebraska. His trick for the 1971 game with the Cornhuskers could include speedster Cliff Branch.

"Colorado actually hasn't used Branch as much this year as they have before," said Nebraska coach Bob Devaney of the Buff split end. "They usually like to use Branch more against us."

Branch has caught 11 passes for 289 yards this season. He's playing second best in the Colorado receiving department, however, to his backup Willie Nichols who has caught 12 passes.

BRANCH IS extremely fast. He is the co-holder of the

world 60-yard dash record with a 5.9 clocking.

"You can't let Branch beat you deep," said Devaney. "Once he gets you deep it's good-bye. You have to avoid getting a guy one-on-one once Branch gets the football."

Defensive secondary coach Warren Powers, however, said there is no special coverage planned for Branch.

"It's difficult to double team a guy when a team runs a triple option offense like Colorado," said Powers. "We have to treat him just like another receiver, but we definitely respect him more for his speed."

BRANCH HAS also earned a good reputation for his punt returning ability. He has returned 20 punts for 324

yards. "We've done a good job of covering punts this year and we'll have to do a good job against Colorado," said Devaney. "We have to try and punt high and get the ball covered quickly."

Devaney said the Buffs have more offensive potential than any team Nebraska has played yet this year. The Colorado running attack could also present some differences Saturday.

Earlier in the season, Colorado used their wide running game to defeat

Louisiana State and Ohio State. Lately, however, Colorado has been gaining its yardage inside.

"I LOOK FOR Colorado to try the wide running plays against us," said Nebraska defensive line coach Monte Kiffin. "They used the triple option a little more against Missouri last week and I think they're gradually getting back to it."

Colorado's "Mr. Wide" is sophomore Charlie Davis, the No. 4 rusher in the Big Eight.

Davis earned national back of the week honors in the game against LSU when he gained

174 yards in 20 carries. He also earned Big Eight honors for his 135 yards in 18 carries against Ohio State.

DAVIS' YARDAGE recently, however, has been from inside runs. He's still averaging 99 yards per game despite those ground-it-out situations.

Cliff Branch and Charlie Davis—two Colorado players who haven't been talked much about lately—could be the Buffalos main attraction for the nationally televised audience Saturday at 12:50 p.m.

## Ingles returns after pro bid

Guy Ingles, the all-time pass receiving leader at Nebraska, returned to the Lincoln campus Wednesday.

Ingles signed with the Kansas City Chiefs after the 1970 season and was placed on

their taxi squad before being cut recently. Ingles then signed with the Cincinnati Bengals, but was cut Friday after being on their taxi squad.

Ingles said he planned to enroll in second semester classes at Nebraska.

## IM football moves toward finals

Abel VI captured the all-dorm intramural football championship Wednesday night on a muddy Vine Street field with a 12-0 triumph over Harper III.

The Abel unit scored once in the first half and added an insurance touchdown on a pass interception on the last play of the third quarter to gain the victory.

Harper battled back in the fourth quarter, retaining the

ball through most of the final period, but they were stymied by poor footing and penalties. Harper tallied two touchdowns in the game's final five plays, but both were called back because of penalties.

Abel VI ended the regular season rated fourth in the dorm division with a 4-1 record. Harper III entered the playoffs undefeated and ranked third.

Abel now faces the Pro Students Thursday night in the

first round of the all-university finals. The other all-University semifinal contest pits Triangle against Alpha Tau Omega.

The winners of Thursday's two games will meet Saturday at 10 a.m. at the Vine fields for the all-University finals, billed by Intramural Director Phil Sienna as the First Annual Orange Bushel Bowl.

Along with the all-university trophy, a bushel of oranges will be presented to Saturday's winner.
