

NU-OU clash overshadows bowls

It's rare when a regularly scheduled game receives more national publicity than announcements of bowl games, but that's exactly the case this year before the Thanksgiving Day battle between Nebraska and Oklahoma.

Bowl announcements, which became official Saturday night, contained no surprises. The topic of conversation has not been Nebraska's Orange Bowl date with Alabama, but Nebraska's Big Eight championship confrontation with Oklahoma.

The outcome of the Nebraska-Oklahoma game could decide which bowl—the Orange or the Sugar—receives the most attention New Years Day; Oklahoma has a

scheduled Sugar Bowl appearance with Auburn.

The winner of the Nebraska-Oklahoma game will carry the No. 1 banner into New Years Day. That is, of course, providing the Sooners beat Oklahoma State and the Cornhuskers handle Hawaii Dec. 4.

The other crucial pre-bowl game this week is Alabama and Auburn who will be battling for the Southeastern Conference championship. Both are undefeated and both are hoping to carry high ratings

into their respective bowls for a shot at the national championship.

At Colorado and Iowa State, however, bowl talk is in the air. The Buffaloes will meet Houston University in the Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl New Years eve, and the Cyclones meet Louisiana State in the Sun Bowl Dec. 20.

It will mark the first bowl appearance in the history of Iowa State and also the first time four Big Eight teams have competed in post-season bowl games.
