Three Dog Night - again

For the second time in two years Three Dog Night packed 'em in at Pershing Auditorium Friday night, bringing the sellout crowd to its feet for multiple standing ovations.

Significantly, Three Dog Night is the No. 1 group in the United States, by volume of record sales and concert attendance. Also significant is the fact the group seems to give the audience what it wants. The same nine musicians that played in Lincoln one year ago once again presented a polished, professional performance.

In fact, the same performance it gave one year ago. Most of the songs were the same songs, in the same arrangements, that were included in last year's performance. Agreed, much of the popular music audience demands that superstar recording groups play their major "hit" singles. Even so, some experimentation and alteration in arrangement could be expected, if nothing else, to reflect the group's creativity. Such was not the case with Three Dog Night.

The group's performance was so consistent and unimaginative that, without any stretch of the imagination, if the audience had closed its eyes it would have sworn it was listening to Golden Biscuits. Even the group's novelty songs came across like instant replays last year's concert. The few new songs performed by the group were vaguely disappointing.

Individually and collectively, Three Dog Night is a group of talented musicians. The three lead singers, Danny Hutton, Chuck Negron and Cory Wells are the best harmony combination in the business as well as smashing individual vocalists. Drummer Floyd Sneed is still the most interesting skin-pounder around.

But it is a pity the group has to play for mass-public-teenybop consumption. In doing so, the group has sacrificed its creativity. That is a tragic loss.
